STRAP PASSENGERS.

In midwinter, when the toy icebreakers are fast among the bergs and the "ten thousand billion tons of ice" of which Captain Read has told us, there is still a way of occasional escape from Prince Edward Island by way of the Capes as "strap passengers." It is by grace of the Government of Canada that we enjoy this exalted privilege. It is a Government service. The Government owns the amphibious boats, shod with runners and equipped with sails, oars and straps. And these straps are a badge and yoke of servitude as we shall see. For in these straps men do the work of beasts of burden and literally bow their necks to the yoke—the Government yoke.

It ought to be mentioned also that this is an inter-provincial service. It is, in fact for weeks, and sometimes for months at a time, the sole means of conveyance for both mails and passengers between this Province and other Provinces of Canada. It has been so during all the thirty-three years that the Island has been a member of the happy and prosperous Dominion family. It is true that the Dominion promised to give us free trade with the other Provinces and to give us efficient and continuous steam service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to and from the Mainland summer and winter and has not done so. But please not to mention that. It is an old "complaint."

The strap passenger should rather reflect upon his privilege. The Government provides him with a boat, an oar and a strap. He may if he chooses provide himself with a pair of long rubber boots, or he may take his chances of wet feet in zero weather. He has also the privilege of paying two dollars to the Government for his ticket. The ticket permits him to wear the strap over his shoulders, and to pull and push and drag at the Government boat, as if he were a horse or mule, guided by human intelligence. The term of his servitude may be three hours or it may be ten; that depends on wind and tide and ice.

He starts from Cape Traverse; he may land at Tormentine, or miles up or down the Strait, on the Mainland side, or he may be glad to escape to the Island shore again. He may, perchance have to spend the night on the drifting ice-floes and may be frost-bitten, maimed or disfigured for the rest of his days, after burning the boat and the mail-sacks in the effort to save life. This has happened more than once. At best, if he gets across, making what is called a good passage, he has endured for hours the perils and hardships of a winter shipwreck, has toiled like a hard-driven beast of burden and has worn a badge and yoke of servitude such as is humiliating to a freeborn citizen.

Not thus do passengers cross from Province to Province on the Mainland. They travel in comfortable cars, warmed with steam heat, sheltered from the wind and storm, waited upon by paid attendants, with dining and smoking rooms provided for their comfort and reflection. They pay two or three cents a mile for this. The strap passengers pay about thirty cents a mile, and wades, rows, clambers over ice-hummocks, tugs, pulls, and alternately sweats and freezes. And this is a Government service, an inter-provincial service, said to be the best the Government of the great and rich Dominion can provide in this twentieth century. This is the sort of service we have in lieu of the stipulated "efficient and continuous steam service for mails and passengers."

It is the shame of Canada, a standing reproach to the Government of the Dominion, that these conditions exist today and nothing done or doing to better them.

It is an insult to our people, a constant humiliation, that we are subjected to such cruel hardship and degrading servitude. And yet with the telegraph, the freight and mail service alternately cut off and passenger transport reduced to the servile strap service, there are still some luxurious sumptuously-faring officials at Ottawa who wonder why we complain! And they regret that there should be discontent in Prince Edward Island!

MANITOBA ELECTIONS.

On Thursday next, 7th March, a general election will take place in Manitoba. The Government of Premier Roblin which first gained office in October 1900 had then two thirds of the House at its back. That large following was increased at the election of 1903 and in the House just now dissolved the Government supporters numbered 33 and the Opposition 7 in a body of 40 members.

No one can with certainty predict what the result of an election may be, but it will not be surprising to find the Roblin Government sustained by a somewhat decreased majority. Their chief cry is for an extension of the provincial boundaries, for which extension the Liberals claim to be equally desirous, and with even better chances of securing it if they were in power. Premier Roblin seems to be personally popular, but one or two other members of this cabinet are not so favorably regarded by the people.

Mails bearing mainland dates of 22nd February came to this office yesterday—ten days old by way of Georgetown and the Stanley. This is the kind of "efficient steam service to and from the Mainland" we are getting these days.

J.T. Clarkin of the postal service is an official who appears not to be afraid to do a little more than mark time. When he organized a party to bring the steamer's mails from Picton Island to White Sands the other day he rendered valuable public service that ought to be placed to his credit. His able assistants too, who had paid their passage by the steamer and then walked across the ice-hummocks, twelve miles or more, dragging His Majesty's mails ought also to be substantially remembered. At least their steamer fares should be refunded to them.

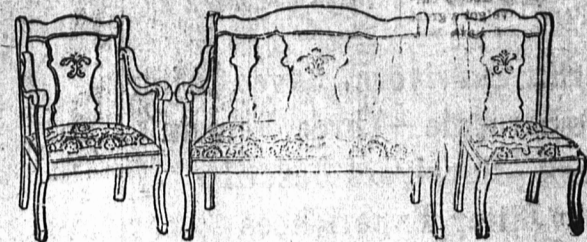
