THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., April 18.—Owing to the Easter holidays in the United Kingdom and on the continent there was very little demand for grain on the Montreal market over the week-end and in consequence the business generally was very quiet. The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was also inactive but the undertone was firm. The volume of business done in spring and winter wheat grades of flour was small and prices were unchanged. The demand for all lines of millfeed continued good and values were steady. There was no improvement in the demand for standard grades of rolled oats. The undertone to the egg market was firm but there was no change in prices. The trade continued quiet. The receipts were 4,352 cases. Prices for all grades of butter were well maintained under a moderate demand. No. 1 pasteurized was quoted at the close at 37 cents to 37 1/2 cts. per pound. The receipts were 597 packages. The market for cheese continued dull and featureless. Western grades were quoted at 16 1/2 cents to 17 cents per pound. The receipts were 215 boxes.

Store Entered Sunday Night

Some time Sunday night or early Monday morning a burglar entered the store of Moore and McLeod was entered and a large quantity of clothing, etc., taken.

The firm can hardly estimate the loss but it is known that the burglars selected the best in clothing, helping themselves to the rack containing the mens tweed suits.

In addition to these suits it is known that a number of boys suits, caps, etc., were also taken.

Entrance was effected through a window in the rear of the men's furnishings department, which was protected by a pair of heavy shutters, fastened by a cross-bar, bolted to one shutter. The intruders evidently forced the shutters outward far enough to insert a wire, or some thin instrument, pushing the cross bar down. A large light of glass was then broken, the glass unlocked and lowered, giving easy access to the burglar or burglars.

After securing their booty they closed over the shutters again so that a watchman would not easily notice the break.

It is surmised there were more than one or two connected with the break, as one person would be compelled to make several trips to the store to carry away the quantity of goods taken.

The matter has been reported to the Police who are now at work.

AT ROTARY

Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, presided at Rotary yesterday the one guest present being Rotarian Thomas Coleman of St. Stephen, N. B.

Dr. S. R. Jenkins, was speaker and gave a fine address on pure milk, the Doctor said, were as follows:

1. All cows should be free from disease. Today we have practically no tuberculosis among our cattle. We have a disease free area but still we have tuberculosis districts.

2. The water supply should be pure, free from disease germs.

3. The stables and buildings housing the cattle should be sanitary.

4. The utensils that contain the milk should be properly prepared for its reception.

5. The milkers should be clean.

The Doctor then discussed each of these essentials. Speaking of the need of having clean milkers he said that men and women may be typhoid carriers and the germs may remain in the system for a number of years and spread among the people, causing epidemics. He said that the milk supply starts at the source of production, hence the need of having the milkers, stable and animals thoroughly inspected. He then dealt on the great importance of pasteurization in providing a pure milk supply, and in this connection gave the history of pasteurization, which was established by Louis Pasteur of France.

In the process, milk is heated to 145 degrees Fahr. for thirty minutes and then cooled to 45 degrees and kept in that temperature until delivered to customers. There is no physical chemical changes in the milk nor its digestibility affected by pasteurization.

The same precautions must be taken as to exposure, providing with ice etc., just the same as with other milk. Pasteurization does not make dirty milk clean but it makes clean milk safe.

Certified milk has been available in some cities in the United States for the past thirty years but its cost is more than people are willing to pay for milk for ordinary purposes. Pasteurization is not a substitute for inspection but is an auxiliary measure. Safe milk supply is as necessary to the weaver of the community as is safe water supply. Statistics show the spread of epidemic on account of impure milk were cited by the Doctor who said that contagious diseases never spread by properly pasteurized milk.

ANOTHER ROBBERY

Yesterday the police located a thirty-two pound case of creamery butter, hidden in a tool box under the grand stand of the C. A. A. Grounds. The butter which was manufactured by the Condensed Milk Factory on the 13th, last Wednesday, was evidently stolen as the firm neither shipped or sold any butter on that date. The case which was broken open, and the contents missing was taken to the police station by Chief Shaw and Officer Dominic Doyle.

TO HOLD CONGRESS — Remarkable results have been attained, it now appears by the visit made three years ago by Rev. Father Cormier, of Shediac, N. B. and Mr. Justice Arsenault of Charlottetown, which was fully reported in our columns at that time and has been subsequently referred to in Louisiana. Ever since the visit both Father Cormier, Judge Arsenault and Acadian leaders in Louisiana have been perpetuating the cordial relations between ancient and modern Acadia. Dr. J. R. Oliver of St. Martinville writing to Judge Arsenault, who is president of the International body which is to hold a big congress in Moncton next August, with excursion to Grand Pre, Shediac and other old Acadian centres, states that he hopes to see some day a public highway from Louisiana to Nova Scotia. Part of it has already been built.

A considerable delegation from Louisiana is expected at the great congress in Moncton.

 ST. JOHN, April 18.—Colonel Norman P. McLeod announces receipt of the following despatch from J. A. McVicar, president of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada:

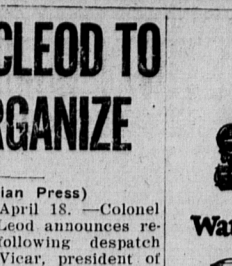
