### PROVINCIALISTS' BOAT WINS.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, June 10.—So far as can be figured the schooner Margaret, owned by Geo. S. Runk of New York, has won the sailing race from New York to Bermuda by about four and a half hours. Three of the yachts crossed the finish mark off St. David's Head this afternoon in one of the most remarkable contests that has ever taken place on the sea. Less than two minutes separated the schooner Amortita, owned by Dr. W. L. Dunn of Chicago, and sailed by the Canadian amateur skipper and designer, H. C. McLeod, and the Margaret. The former was first over but as the Margaret had an allowance of four hours and thirty minutes, and finished right on the Amortita's heels, the Margaret proved the winner on her allowance. The schooner Crusader II., owned by Edwin Palmer, of the Atlantic Yacht Club, came over the line 38 minutes and 55 sec-

onds after the Margaret. The start was made from Gravesend Bay, at 10 a.m. Saturday and the finishing times were as follows:—

Margaret, 4.21.12.  
Crusader II., 5.20.07.  
Nothing has been heard from the power boats which started from Gravesend Bay at 4.35 Saturday afternoon.

### THE COUNTRY LIFE COMMISSION

The "Country Life Commission" which reported at the last Session of Congress says regarding Education: "There must be a new work, Education adapted to the real needs of the farming people. The country schools are to be so re-directed that they shall educate their pupils in terms of the daily life towards agricultural callings. Every person on the land must have a chance to receive the information necessary for a successful and resourceful life at home. This means a vastly increased interest in the welfare of country boys and girls. Education by means of Agriculture is to be a part of our regular school work. There is to be a well developed plan to extension teaching conducted by the Agricultural Colleges designed to reach every farmer and his family. Farmers need a more fully organized, social recreation life. It is indispensable that they shall work together for their common interests and for the National welfare. Now that the Educational Commission has begun to hold meetings throughout the Province these matters should be considered very seriously by all farmers and they should be prepared to attend these meetings and express their opinions to this Commission."

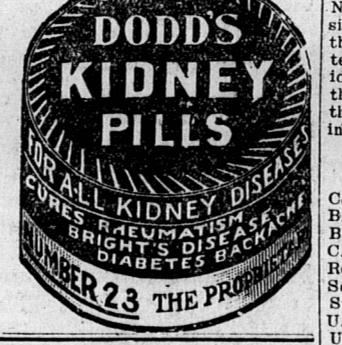
