THE MARKET.—Yesterday's market was a small one. Eggs and butter were each retailing at 48c., chickens \$1.25 to \$1.50 pair, and fowl \$2.00 to \$2.25 pair. There was a large supply of vegetables of all kinds retailing as follows: Tomatoes, 12c lb. ripe, green 25c peck; corn 30 to 35c doz.; cauliflower 5 to 10c head; onions 5 to 8c lb., carrots and parsnips 10c doz.; pumpkins and squash 4c lb. The dealers are paying prices as follows: oats, bush, 70c; potatoes 60c., hay, ton, \$15; straw \$10 and turnips 25c bush.
