CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

On Sunday evening a chorale "Green Hill Far Away" and an anthem were rendered with splendid effect.

The Rev. Morgan E. Genge, Ph.D., D.D., preached both morning and evening. His subject was "The Angelic Prelude."

He said: "In every divine historic event recorded in the Bible, God sent on His messengers in advance, thus showing us how near Heaven is to earth, and how intensely concerned is the Almighty in the redemption of man and the human race, and, also, His consuming interest in the establishment of His Kingdom on Earth."

In the evening the doctor spoke with great earnestness and clarity on the subject "The Declaration of Righteousness."

The doctor in part declared: "It is written—My Father's House is called a House of Prayer, but ye have made it a den of thieves."

"Here is" said the preacher, "no ambiguity about this text or concerning what Jesus meant. He goes beyond His times. He penetrates beyond mere circumstances. He goes to the root of the tree planted in righteousness, but rotten and decayed by the institutionalism of an ancient people, and destined to be decanted by the formality and organization of the ages to come."

"Jesus is the prophet as we are priest and king, and in the passage before us, He looks down upon a church, once pure and progressive by the primitive laws of His righteousness, to a day upon which the Bride has fallen upon apostasy and adultery."

"Jesus paid the price of a reformer, as He looks down upon a church when with a corded whip he drove from the temple the Jewish graters of His day."

"Graters, I say, for graters and rackets were, who would load upon the people of His day, the burdens of taxation which these profiteers would not so much as touch with their polluted fingers."

"This is Palm Sunday. What does this day mean to you and me? It means still the driving from the Temple of God worshippers of the golden calf. And shall we stop there? Oh, no! Calvary next and after Calvary the glorious resurrection of the Son of God, the establishment of the new order, which shall never grow old; the new heaven and the new earth wherein dwelleth Righteousness and He is the Light thereof."

"The Declaration of Righteousness is the foundation of the Four Great Freedoms of the United Nations, and these freedoms must fall without the Christ; and you and I must fall in our claims, without His Atoning Blood, His Resurrection and His Vindication of His Cross. His sweat, His blood and His resurrection out from among the dead."
