NEW GLASGOW OFF TO WEST IN DECEMBER

NEW GLASGOW, Nov. 20.—The New Glasgow hockey team will leave on their Western Canadian tour about the fifth of December according to present plans. Officials of the local club will meet C. N. R. officials tomorrow to settle all arrangements. The local team is practically intact with Daddy Bubar, Jimmie McLean and another goalie mentioned for the nets. Bubar may not make the trip to the West but he is practically assured for league games. On the defence the local squad have Don McDougall, a local boy who played with the Socials last season, "Red" Teller, who returned from Montreal on Saturday and Paddy Nolan, last year with the local squad. On the front line they have Whit Fraser, Wes Nicholson, Charlie LeRose Jordan for a certainty and the possibilities are bright that Joe Beaton, Paddy Cormier and Joe Nairn, three members of last year's Stellation team, will make up the party. The definite lineup has not been announced but this will be given out by the local officials following the meeting tomorrow. The team will go to Halifax late next week to practice for a short time at the Forum previous to their departure for the West. The first game on the tour will be played at Montreal and the second at Ottawa, after which the outfit will hit out for Winnipeg, Regina and other centres farther West. They will likely return about the end of December so as to be able to open the Eastern League schedule around January 1. The team will go into active training this week, it was announced today. Satisfactory quarters have been secured for the purpose and Coach Bob Holland is quite optimistic over the arrangements made at the present time.

ATLANTICS WILL GO TO BOSTON

MONCTON, Nov. 20.—The Atlantics had a private session in the City Hall last evening when only members of the team and officials of the club were present. In a statement after the meeting officials of the club said only matters pertaining to the club and plans for the coming season were discussed. It was announced, however, that the invitation extended to the Atlantics by the University Club of Boston for a two game exhibition series on January 24 and 25 had been accepted. Coach Frank Brown was present and he said after the meeting that the players would workout on Thursday and Saturday night in St. Bernard's gym. Asked concerning the rumor that Ed. Kervin would play for the C. N. R. team in the Montreal Railway-Telephone League this winter, officials of the club had nothing definite to report but said that it was likely the big defence man would wear an Atlantic uniform this winter. Everything possible will be done to keep him with the team, they said, and as it is known that Kervin would rather play with the Atlantics, it is more than likely he will be beside his mate, "Dekker" Wilson, when the teams line-up for the league games.

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Tonight at 8.15 p. m. the Anchors meet the Crescents and a real good game is expected.

and only 300 copies are for sale, but it marks a stage in the development of the art of color reproduction. The Codex has an interesting history. It seems to have originated at Zurich at the court of the patrician family of Manesse, who were the great patrons of song and poetry towards the close of the 13th century. The poets Hedlaub and Konrad von Mure may have had a hand in the production of the work, and the beauty of the illuminations all point to the fact that the volume was intended to be an outstanding monument of the Minnesänger's art. From the time of its completion the Codex was completely lost until 1571, when it reappeared in the catalogue of the Palatine Library. Later the elector Frederick IV, lent it to a relative and experienced great difficulty in recovering it. For years it seems to have remained at St. Gall, in the house of the antiquary Schönbinger, who is said to have shortened his days in the attempt to copy it and have it printed. In 1662 it travelled with the rest of the Palatine Library across the Alps to Rome. In 1675 it was in the Royal Library at Paris, where it was carefully rebound. Many attempts to get it back were made. Grimm made a valiant attempt in 1815 and Gustav Freytag again in 1870, but it was not until 1888, through the agency of the bookseller Trubner, that after more than 250 years this precious volume was redeposited at Heidelberg. The fates had watched over it carefully, for had it been at Heidelberg in 1693 it would have perished when the French destroyed the Palace and laid the town in ruins.
