EGGS AND POULTRY IN CANADA

number of eggs 190.25 dozen per farm.
The average number of hens on each farm this year is estimated at 7.45, and the total of eggs produced in this Province at 5,000,000 dozen, valued at \$1,000,000, of which \$600,000,000 dozen will be shipped. Prices paid to farmers in the spring months were 14 to 20 cents; in October and November, 25 to 35 cents. Expected prices are: December, 25 cents; Jan., 25 cents; and February, 25 cents. It is estimated that 1,500,000 dozen are now held here in storage. Shipments are made to Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, the United Kingdom, and the United States. The prevailing export price for eggs during October, 1910, was \$3.50 per case, 60 b. Charlottetown. Eggs have advanced here from an average price of 9 cents in 1909 to 15 cents in 1910 and to 25 cents in 1911.

Poultry Raising in Prince Edward Island

Poultry raising in Prince Edward Island is receiving much more attention now than formerly, due to the increasing prices for eggs, and to the fact that chickens, during a steady market at 14 to 15 cents per pound, an increase of nearly 50 per cent over the prices of eight years ago.

The Prince Edward Island Poultry Association, which receives some pecuniary aid from the local government, was organized a few years ago, and to its efforts is due much of the increased interest among farmers in this branch of industry. The association has been instrumental in introducing the best breeds for this latitude and during four consecutive years was held the coldest day in this period being -13.

The most successful chicken raisers build hen houses that are at all times dry and free from drafts, though well ventilated and lighted. For the winter a good-sized scratch pan is used, the floor of which is covered to a depth of 6 to 8 inches with short straw or chaff into which the grain is scattered, so as to keep the hens at work constantly. A dust box and a plentiful supply of grit and crushed oyster shells are provided.

The winter pen during the day is open at one of the fore doors and closed at night by canvas curtains. An all-duck eggs during the cold season and different varieties of mash are fed with grains. As regards breeds, the White Leghorn, Plymouth Rock, Orpington and Wyandottes have almost supplanted all others. An all-duck shows are held by the Prince Edward Island Poultry Assn., at which prizes are given to the owners of the best exhibits.
