HALIFAX TO LAKE ST. JOHN QUEBEC.

OTTAWA, July 20.—Word has reached the Air Board offices here of the completion of the successful flight of over 600 miles from Halifax to St. John Que., by Col. Leckie, of the Civil Operations Branch of the Air Board, and his companion, Col. Wilson. The flight was each pilot a "flyin' boat" which was to be delivered at Lake St. John from Halifax for exploration purposes in the region and north of St. John. The exploration and survey work to be carried out is being financed jointly by the Quebec and Federal Governments, the course Col. Leckie flew across country, using a series of lakes as landing places.

Air Board officers here regard the flight as a remarkably successful one which had not previously been attempted in Canada under similar conditions. In the survey and exploration work which is to be carried out in the northern part of Quebec Province, ground can be visited by hydro-planes, which would not be accessible within six weeks' journey by canoe and on foot and these latter two were the only modes of travelling previously employed. The hydro-plane station which is being opened at Lake St. John will be continued in operation until this fall, it is anticipated.

VIEW WITH ALARM EXODUS OF TURKS.

SMYRNA, July 20.—The British commission visiting the Smyrna districts and other parts of Turkey occupied by the Greek Army are trying to quiet the uneasy Moslem population and stem the exodus of Turks, which is assuming alarming proportions.

British assurances that there will be no repetitions of the massacres which occurred when the Greeks originally occupied Smyrna under the Supreme Council's order have not quieted Turkish unrest.

There is a general exodus of Turkish families eastward and southward into the Ilianan area and from Thrace into Bulgaria, while Constantinople is crowded with the better class of Turkish families. As the Turks are the actual laborers and framers in the occupied areas the exodus is viewed here with alarm.

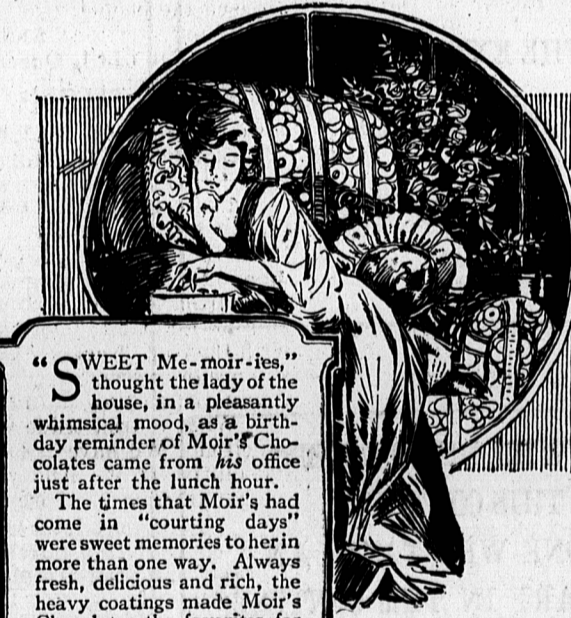
MONTREAL, July 22.—The Herald tonight says

The buying of Atlantic Sugar stocks, during the past week or ten days, has, according to well-informed circles here for insiders' account, it is quite evident that the latter have full cognizance of what the ultimate plans of the sugar management are in the way of large dividend disbursements and the disbursements and the distribution of stock among the shareholders during the next two or three months.

It is believed that President McGibbon at the annual meeting on Monday next will only unfold a certain amount of the plans of the Company for the present at least, but the Herald has been fully decided on, and this will leave the big surprise for a later date.

One thing is certain, the management will pay off in cash on September 1, next, all preferred arrears while on or about October 7, the initial dividend of ten, if not twelve per cent, on the common stock will be declared.

While it is the intention of the sugar management to later on exchange the preferred for common stock, share for share, it is reported that the big financial interests in New York City, who are heavy holders of sugar securities are in favor of breaking up the common, giving four new shares for one of the old. This could not be verified but the Herald was assured by a leading broker that such a proposition
