THE LAURIER BANQUET.

MONTREAL, May 30—Surrounded by Liberal Leaders from practically every province of the Dominion and cheered by hundreds of his most ardent admirers, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, portrayed the Liberal party as not so badly off as some would have the people believe. Passing lightly over the Liberal defeats sustained since the regime entered upon its career at Ottawa, and interpreting the recent Liberal successes as certain indications of great triumphs to follow, the Leader of the Opposition evoked round after round of applause from the solid Liberal audience, applause which increased in fervor when he launched into an attack upon the present Government.

As a tribute from Liberals to the honored Leader the banquet tendered Sir Wilfrid by the Montreal Reform Club at Windsor last night was a great success.

The leaders of the Liberal Government from those provinces wherein the party is in power sat side by side with their less fortunate brethren who lead the Liberal Opposition. Practically all of the last Liberal Cabinet were in attendance, while among the speakers were many of the younger men of the party.

Nearly six hundred were present and the capacity of the dining hall was over-taxed, but no one failed to hear the event of the evening. Sir Wilfrid's address for his voice never wavered during his long oration.

The remarkable enthusiasm displayed at the banquet indicated that the Liberal party are united, harmonious and full of fight and vigor. It indicates that they are rapidly regaining from the effects of the fluky victory by the Conservatives on September 21st and determined to retrieve the defeat at the first opportunity. NEW IMMIGRATION BUILDINGS FOR QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, May 29—The Dominion Government has begun the construction of a fine immigration shed at Quebec. The building will be 600 feet long, 80 feet wide, two stories in height, and will be built of steel, concrete and brick. The upper stories will be used for the inspection of immigration, and the lower floor devoted to baggage, restaurants, ticket office, etc. The shed will cost about \$500,000.

LONDON PRESS ATTACKS SMITH.

LONDON, May 29—The press here, likening Senator Smith to a bombastic furioso, savagely attacks him, his speech and the recommendations of the Senate Titanic Committee. Under the heading "Waterlight Smith," the Mail says: "The speech was a violent and unreasonable diatribe, in which the Senator betrays once more the amazing ignorance which prompted him to ask during the inquiry whether watertight compartments were intended as a refuge for passengers."

The Express says:—"Although much of the Senate committee's report on the loss of the Titanic sounds sensible, Senator Smith surprised himself, and we can only echo the words of a New York contemporary, 'Oh, what an ass!'"

The Chronicle says:—"England will reserve judgment until Lord Mersey presents his report. The recommendations of the tribunal presided over by him will carry far more weight than the report of Senator Smith's committee."

The Standard sneers at Senator Smith's reputed suggestion that all steamships carry buoys to mark the spot where they go down.
