## ENGLAND TO RECORD FACES OF HER SONS

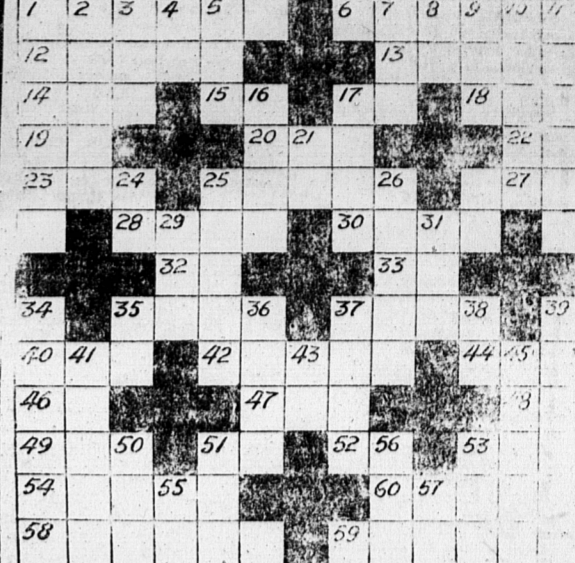
Already 2,000 of the Great and Near-Great Have Posed for this National Collection Which is to go Into the Galleries Archives.

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The National Portrait Gallery is compiling photographs of distinguished men and women in all fields of British life. Already 2,000 of the great and near-great have posed for this national collection, which is going into the gallery's archives.

Very few of the faces in the collection are feminine. This is not entirely due to the fact that women of prominence outside the domestic sphere are rarer than men; it is partly because—well, one knows how women are about their photographs. It is an ex-ceptional person, man or woman, who becomes distinguished before the age of forty. Some of the beauty of women often fades before then, so that the trustees of the National Portrait Gallery have not been greatly surprised, when in several instances, after inviting a distinguished woman to have her picture made for their collection, the lady visited a photographer but refused to approve of the result.

Photographs of more than 150 of the distinguished contemporaries, as the trustees of the gallery call those whom they invite to sit for their collection, have recently been placed on public exhibition. Most of the faces are old, but some of them, notably John Drinkwater's, the dramatist, are on the sunny side of middle-age. Only one man in the collection wears a monocle—Austin Chamberlain, the foreign secretary. And even more strange since these are Britons, is the absence of a pipe. The procession of prominent men who have passed before the camera for the National Portrait Gallery collection includes besides statesmen, politicians, generals, admirals and divines, leaders in other activities—almost all of them in fact. There are grizzled old ship-building magnates, authors, artists, musicians, doctors of medicine and surgeons, railroad officials. There is the rugged face of Thomas Hardy the small

## May Withdraw Wembley Exhibit

OTTAWA, Jan. 15—If as reported cable instructions have gone forward to Exhibition Commissioner Tormie to withdraw the Canadian exhibit at Wembley this year should the threatened ban be placed on Canadian motor cars, such instruction it was stated here must have gone forward directly from Hon. J. A. Robb, the Minister, who has dealt with all matters connected with the Exhibition. Mr. Robb and his assistant, who are out of town could not be reached. The opinion expressed here is that if it is really sought to ban from the Exhibition an industry so important as that of Canadian motor cars of which the export is extensive and withdrawal from the whole show would be justified. Officials here find it hard to believe that any such exclusion is really planned, and are inclined to think that there has been some misunderstanding admitting of adjustment.

## MOTHER'S RING

A jeweller of original ideas has designed a ring which has become a sort of talisman and is much in demand. ## Attempt On Life Of Former King Arouses Greeks

BUCHAREST, Jan. 15—Copies of Greek newspapers received here show that public opinion in Greece is very much in favor of ex-King George and that the recent attempt to assassinate him has caused indignation among the Greek people. Details of the attempt upon the life of the former king disclose that he was surprised in the forest near Sinaia by a band of Greeks who fired several shots at him, none of which, however, hit their mark. The police allege that the would-be assassins, all of whom are in jail, were in close contact with an organization in Athens which aims to remove the ex-king from the throne.
