TEA.—To open the new hall at Notre Dame Academy, Charlottetown, a five o'clock Tea will be held, Thursday, January thirteenth.

THE NIOBE.—No intimation whatever has been received at the Dockyard as to the sailing of the Niobe for St. John, says a Halifax exchange.

FOX INDUSTRY.—There is considerable excitement here over the organization of the Middleton Silver Black Fox Ranch, Ltd. D. A. Wedlock, of Charlottetown, who holds stock in several P. E. Islands companies, and is vice-president of one of them, is the promoter and a number of our leading business men have taken hold of the enterprise, says a St. John exchange. About \$10,000 of the required \$40,000 has been already subscribed. The ranch will be located north of Middleton in a natural fox territory.

F. P. BRADY ILL.—The report comes from Moncton that F. P. Brady, General Superintendent of the I. C. R., is obliged through ill health to go south for treatment in a sanatorium. The report says further that Mrs. Brady and their children are going west to live. It will be remembered that a few weeks ago it was reported Mr. Brady, while on an official trip to Quebec, had a stroke of paralysis. This was not correct but it is true that on that occasion he was seized with lumbago, and rendered unable to walk or nearly so. Mr. Brady is well known in this province through his connection with the railway.

EXCELLENT PROGRAM.—An excellent program of pictures was shown at the People's Theatre, Charlottetown last evening, but the main attraction was the opening engagement of Louis Ritzins, of Chicago, as singer. Mr. Ritzins has been soloist of St. Patrick's Catholic Church of Ottawa, the St. Mark's Church, Philadelphia, and the Church of the Ascension, St. Louis, and has also toured Western Canada with the English Grand Opera Company. The manager of the People's Theatre has been indeed fortunate in securing his services and by the grand reception accorded him last night his efforts were proven to be appreciated by the large crowd present.

A PROMOTION.—The many friends in Halifax, Washington, of William Cole, formerly of Found's Mills, P. E. I., are very pleased to see the great mark he has made in public life. His mother was Mary Jane McKay of Wigmore Road who is now living with her son Mr. Cole in Halifax. Mr. Cole left his old home eighteen years ago and went to Halifax where he has resided ever since. Mr. Cole has always acted the part of a good citizen since he came to Halifax and in February, 1908, was appointed Deputy Sheriff of Whitman County which office he filled up to last October, when he was nominated for Republican candidate for High Sheriff of Whitman County, Washington, to contest on November 8th. On that date he was elected High Sheriff by the largest majority of any candidate that ever ran for any office in Whitman County. Mr. Cole deserves much credit for the high office he now holds and was sworn in on the nineteenth of January, 1913.

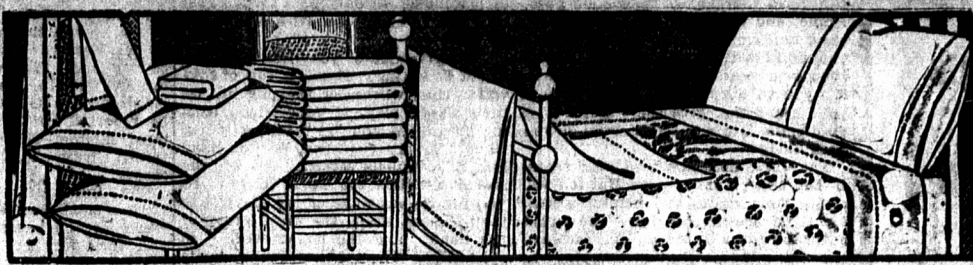
