THANKSGIVING DAY.

Hitherto custom in both the United States and Canada has fixed upon Thursday as the day of the week on which the annual national Thanksgiving shall be held. For some years past The Guardian has put forward from year to year certain reasons why Monday would be a more fitting and convenient day for the purpose and this year we note that the Commercial Travellers' Association have taken the matter up and are sending a deputation to Ottawa to urge upon the Government to propriety of a change.

The reasons which move the commercial men to favor Monday rather than Thursday are precisely those which have been from time to time put forward in this journal. Thanksgiving has become in only less degree than Christmas, a day for family reunions, a time for the absent sons and daughters to return to the old homesteads, to sit down again at the family table and renew the tender associations of earlier years. It is largely to facilitate and promote these family reunions that the change in the day of observance from Thursday to Monday has been thus advocated for years past. It is for these reasons that the commercial travellers ask for a change.

By the adoption of Monday for Thanksgiving it is claimed that many would be given the opportunity to return to the old home on Saturday and to spend both Sunday and Monday there, with less inconvenience and more comfort and satisfaction than they would have in obtaining a shorter time in the middle of the week. Especially is this true of the thousands of Canadians who at present reside in New England or the border States, and whose former homes were in the Maritime Provinces, the distance to be travelled being about one day's journey by rail. We think there is a good deal of force in this contention.

We shall be glad to learn that the representations made to the Government in this matter may now prove effective, although the Toronto Globe's Ottawa correspondence tells that the change is not likely to be made this year. It is evident that the movement for fixing the date of Thanksgiving on Monday is growing stronger from year to year and must in the end prevail, and we trust that the Government may yet realize the fact and make the change. No weighty reasons have been put forward in favor of retaining Thursday for the observance. It is simply a case of inertia, a clinging to the old order of things for no better reason than that it has been long established.

Higher and higher are the new buildings of New York thrust upward toward the sky. It was not long ago that ten storeys was the limit. This was extended to fifteen and twenty storeys in height. Now the new Singer building on Broadway is nearing completion and is of 40 storeys, towering 612 feet above the sidewalk to the base of the flagstaff. The distance from the basement to the top of the flagstaff is 742 feet. In the entire structure there are 91 acres of floor space, and when the offices are fully occupied they will accommodate 6,000 people. Twenty elevators will carry them up and down and 16,000 incandescent lamps will supply them with artificial light.

DEDICATION OF ST. DUNSTAN'S.

The formal dedication of St. Dunstan's Cathedral will take place today with solemn and imposing services. The new Cathedral is the largest, the most beautiful and most costly of the edifices yet erected in this Province for divine worship. It is architecturally splendid without, beautiful within and is an ornament to the City. It reflects the highest credit upon Bishop McDonald, Vicar General Morrison and the congregation, who have labored so long and faithfully and made so many sacrifices to bring it to completion.

The central site upon which the Cathedral stands has been for nearly a century the property of the Church, and the present elaborate and noble edifice is the fourth place of worship erected on the spot. It is built to endure, everything in the structure being of the most solid and substantial character. It is worthy of note also that during the period in which the Cathedral has been under construction nine or ten Catholic Church buildings have been erected within the diocese.

The zeal and self-sacrifice of our Catholic fellow citizens thus displayed in support of their faith and to make their Cathedral expressive of the best, a song of praise in itself, is worthy of all commendation and furnishes a worthy example to other churches. It is, we believe, the rule that no Roman Catholic Church can be dedicated while any debt remains upon it, and as the cost of the Cathedral will approximate \$230,000, it will be seen that so large an outlay could not be made, in a comparatively small community, except on a basis of generous contributions from each and all who are to worship within its portals.

DEATH OF W. W. WELLNER.

We deeply regret to record the death of W. W. Wellner, which occurred at his home on Prince Street last evening. The sad event was not altogether unexpected, as he had been seriously ill and had suffered greatly for months past.

Mr. Wellner was one of Charlottetown's best citizens, a man of probity and honor, a devout Christian and one who was esteemed and respected in all the relations of life. His demise creates a sad vacancy in the home, the first break in a happy family circle, and he will be much missed in business and religious circles as well.

Uncle Sam is undertaking a feat somewhat comparable to that of Russia in the war with Japan, in sending his battleship fleet to the Pacific. The fleet will include four supply ships, nine colliers and six torpedo boats, making 25 sail in all.
