Hints to Teachers

Sir.—I thought I was a member of the Teachers' Union, having paid the membership fee, but did not sign the form. I had suggested a mass meeting of teachers to be held at some central place. At such a meeting I had anticipated an interesting discussion, resulting in certain modifications to the bye-laws, in which case a great many more teachers would have joined. I had suggested a meeting of all teachers so as to be able to enroll the delinquent ones.

But a meeting was held only for the members, and I understood that some soothing remonstrance was administered by some prominent speakers, with the result that a resolution of a very mild type was passed. In an interview with a member who was returning from the meeting, the writer was given to understand that there was something wanting in the organization. As I am an ardent advocate of the Union, and have been deprived of the privilege of attending the meeting, I now avail myself of the only opportunity at my disposal, that of the medium of the press. To the teachers, I would say: We have the opportunity of our lives. The government has shown its sincere desire to help us; but in its discretion it appeals to the people. It is now up to us to force the hand of the people. And these are the things we must do: first, let us ask for a decision from the government before the annual school meeting, necessitating the holding of the plebiscite before that date; second, let us set our wage to a much higher figure than what is stipulated in the by-laws of the union; third, let us express our demands through the press; and fourth, perhaps the most important, let us call a meeting of all teachers of the province, and have everyone sign.

In conclusion, let us be united firm and exacting. I trust though imperfect this is, it will catch the eye of all teachers especially of those who are at the head of this organization. I am, Sir, etc., TEACHER.

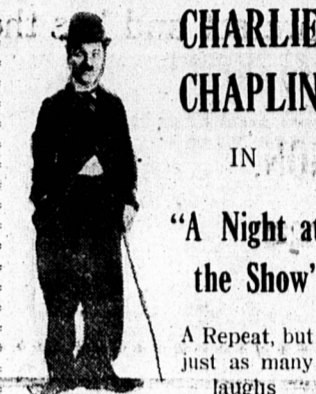
