THE PANAMA CANAL

WASHINGTON, July 31— Unless congress takes action to provide for the operation of the Panama canal at the present session, President Taft and Secretary of War Stimson, believe that it will be practically impossible for the army engineers to keep their promise to open the big ditch to the ships of the world next year. According to the information brought to the white house today, the prospect of action by congress on canal legislation at this session, is growing dimmer.

Mr. Stimson was understood to believe that there is little contention over the proposed administration and operation of the canal, but the questions of tolls, and of railroad owned steamships have stirred up controversy in both houses and today neither the president nor his secretary of war was hopeful of settling it.

The Panama bill was put aside again in the senate today after Senator Brandegee, who is guiding it, stated that adjournment probably would be hastened if it were considered in the senate while the post office bill was in conference, but the only ray of comfort that filtered thru to the white house was the news that Representative Admon, of Georgia, chairman of the house committee on interstate commerce, was considering the introduction of a joint resolution, providing for the machinery of administration and operation of the canal. Mr. Admon was understood to be ready to bring in such a question whenever it becomes apparent that there is no chance of a compromise and the two houses become deadlock over the other questions.

President Taft was much concerned today over the prospect of a delay in the opening of the canal, when he broke ground at San Francisco last October for the Panama-Pacific exposition, he practically promised the people of the slope country to have the canal ready next year. He spoke of the Oregon as the ship that should first cleave its waters and made it clear that he would like to be on the bridge when the trip began. So far the president has refused to write a special message to congress on the subject of the canal.

SHOT HUSBANDS MISTRESS PARIS, July 31—Mme. Bloch, a story writer and contributor to the children's papers, today proceeded to the home of Mrs. Bridgeman, the wife of James E. Bridgeman, an employee of the Paris agency of the New York Life Insurance company, and shot her dead.

Mrs. Bridgeman, who was separated from her husband resided in an apartment in the Rue Vignon, under the name of Berhard, her maiden name. She was the daughter of Henry Berhard, of Milwaukee.

The tragedy was the outcome of an attachment between Madame Bloch's husband and Mrs. Bridgeman. Mme. Bloch, who remained cool and composed after the shooting, seemed well satisfied with what she had done. She told the police that Mrs. Bridgeman had made her life almost unbearable for two years. Before she killed her Mrs. Bloch read letters which her husband had written to her, indicating that he still had affection for her, but Mrs. Bridgeman, she said, laughed in her face. It was then that she drew a revolver from her handbag and shot the woman dead.

Interrogated by the examining magistrate, Mme. Bloch said defiantly: I am at last avenged. My husband deserted his home to follow his mistress I have no regrets for an act of vengeance which cuts the knot.

CARDINAL ATTACKS STYLE OF DRESS. ROME, July 30—The church has from time to time raised its voice in no uncertain manner over the present day fashions, with, it must be confessed, little appreciable effect. Now the great Cardinal Cavallari, patriarch of Venice, a personal friend of Pius X. has taken up the question, and in a discourse in the cathedral of the Queen of Ardratic he told the women of Venice, and, thru the press, the women of all Italy, what the church thinks of those who dress in the present extreme styles.

His scathing denunciation must have caused some searchings of heart in many of his congregation. It was noticeable that day that the confessionals were overcrowded with women altho they appeared in the objectionable cut garments, and have not yet discarded them.

The cardinal's discourse is interesting even outside Italy. He recalled what St. Peter said on the subject of women's greatest adornment, and asked the pertinent question whether such was the leading idea when he went on: Today the immodesty of the mode of the dressing of many women has arrived at such a point that even men who are naturally virtuous are disgusted and repelled. Where is the modesty of those who wear the present-day costumes? What does that impudent nudity mean but lack of virtue!

I declare now, publicly, that at the first Sunday communions at my house I shall not allow anyone dressed in that way to appear with children. I am at home there, and shall assert my authority. The patriarch then made a gossamer appeal to the fathers of families to put a stop to the abuse.

THE HERBERT CASE. MONTREAL, July 31—D. J. Lefebvre, counsel for Eugene Herbert, one of the principals in the famous marriage annulment, announced this morning that he was ready to carry the case through to the Privy Council, if his client was willing.

Mr. Lefebvre pointed out that he has already entered an appeal against the decision of Judge Charbonneau, quashing the annulment of the marriage of Judge Laurendeau. The hearing of this appeal comes up before the Court of Revision in October.

If appeals are to be continued through to the Privy Council, financial assistance will have to be given Mrs. Herbert. She is at the present time out of the country, though her lawyers say they can easily secure her attendance when her case comes up.
