COURSES FOR GIRLS
1. HOME IMPROVEMENT: Three (3) courses shall be held, each to last approximately six weeks.

COURSES FOR MEN
1. BLACKSMITHING: One (1) five months course in general blacksmithing, woodworking, sleigh and wagon building.

COURSES FOR MEN AND WOMEN
1. AGRICULTURE: Course to provide instruction in animal and field husbandry, farm management and other subjects.

The last of these causes could be eliminated altogether if the engine which powers your thrasher or crusher is placed in a different building from the barn or is placed outside a reasonable distance from the barn door so that the fumes from the engine will not come in the barn door and permeate the air in the barn.
