Four Island schooners are at our wharves with fifteen thousand bushels of potatoes, intended for Ontario and Quebec. The potatoes are owned by Capt. Jos. Head, of Summerside, who has sent big shipments West this year. The potatoes are in bulk and will be bagged here, the schooners probably wintering in the harbor. Capt. Head has sent twenty-five thousand bushels to Cuba this year. Despite the heavy crop of potatoes on the Island, the failure of the crop in other places kept the price up and Poole and Thompson, of Montague, were paying forty cents per bushel. The last few Island schooners supplying our market sold in small lots at forty-six cents and we have heard of potatoes selling as low as forty-three, so that Pictou came out all right, and Pictou county farmers seem to have no trouble in getting fifty-five cents per bushel which shows that Pictou County product is much preferred to the Island.—Pictou Advocate.
