HOME FROM SYNOD.—Judge Warburton returned home Saturday night from Fredericton where he attended the meeting of the Synod of the Ecclesiastical province of Canada, and visited his daughter Mrs. Bate, wife of Rev. A. F. Bate, Rector of the Fredericton Church. Mrs. Warburton, who left the Island with him, remained at Fredericton on a more extended visit. The Judge states that there was a good attendance at the Synod meetings. Among the important matters for discussion was the admission of a clergyman of another denomination to the pulpit of the Anglican Church. This was carried 29 to 0 by the Lower House, or the ordinary clergy and laity, but it was vetoed by the Bishops. The discussion of this question on both sides was of a very high order, the best the Judge had seen for many years. Other matters were not of very important interest and the Synod was adjourned in session. There was a good attendance of clergy and laity from both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and there was a good attendance from Montreal and Quebec.

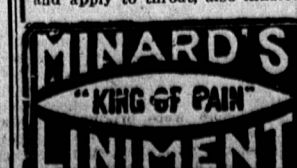
