CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with Crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL

Favourable weather for harvesting now prevails throughout the Prairie Provinces and wheat cutting is general. In Southern Manitoba and Saskatchewan threshing has commenced and as anticipated the returns both as to yield and grade are disappointing; better results are expected in the Northern sections of the Provinces and also in Alberta. In the latter Province the Department of Agriculture has estimated the wheat yield at 150,000,000 bushels. In Quebec cool weather is still retarding the ripening of crops, but

grain cutting on a small scale has started with average yields. In Ontario threshing yields of Fall wheat are most satisfactory. Oats and barley are slightly below the average. In New Brunswick hay crop though harvested in good condition is light, while in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island it is heavy and of first quality. In British Columbia grain yields are above the average. Apple picking is general in the Okanagan Valley early varieties being above the average. Details follow.

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

EDMONTON DISTRICT.—Harvesting general. Conditions favorable. Slight damage during week from rain and hail. Only few cases of rust. Grain well filled. Good average yield now assured.

CALGARY DISTRICT.—Severe hail around Stettler, with this exception conditions favorable. Harvesting general. Very heavy growth. LETHBRIDGE DISTRICT.—Cutting general. Threshing should commence 30th August.

SASKATOON DISTRICT.—Weather favorable and harvesting well under way, with probably 1-3 of wheat cut. Good yield of all grains promised in North Saskatchewan. REGINA DISTRICT.—Wheat cutting 40% completed and threshing commenced. Returns in southeastern section will be fair to poor, with low grades. Labor districts more promising. Labor supply ample. WINNIPEG DIST.—Good harvesting weather generally. Threshing returns are disappointing in the South and run from 5 to 15 bushels per acre of low grade. In the North both yield and grade are higher.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Cool weather has retarded the growth and ripening of all late crops. Grain is backward, but cutting on a small scale has commenced and a fair average crop is predicted. Roots look promising for a good average crop. Pasture is good in the Eastern townships and Montreal districts, other districts only fair.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Threshing is general. The yield of Fall wheat is most satisfactory. Oats and barley will be slightly below the average. Corn, roots and pasture have been greatly improved by recent rains. Storms during the past week did considerable damage to fruits. In the Niagara district the apple crop will be fair.

MARITIME PROVINCES

NEW BRUNSWICK.—conditions generally improving. St. John

Valley Hay crop light, but mostly harvested in good condition. Potatoes promise fair yield. In the Northern district crops are making fairly good progress and in the Eastern district hay and grass pasture good. Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island—Grass pasture excellent and large hay crop of first quality harvested. Everything promises well, but crops are late and warm weather is needed. In the Annapolis Valley recent gales destroyed 20% of the and of good quality. Peas and early apples, but all varieties clean and of good quality. Peas and plums are poor.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Growing crops now in need of rain. Grain yields above average. Threshing well under way. Roots fair. Potatoes good crop, but acreage below average. Hops very good, picking commences next week. In the Okanagan Valley apples picking is now general, early varieties which were well thinned are above average in size and quality. Peaches moving fast, early varieties over. Plums, prunes, tomatoes moving up to expectations. Pasturage good, except Vancouver Island.

BRUCHES INSTITUTE, MONTREAL DESTROYED BY FIRE.

MONTREAL, Sept. 1.—The Bruches Institute on the corner of Demontigny and St. Hubert streets in the east end of the city was partly destroyed by fire this evening. The Institute is under the control of the Sister of Providence and houses about 106 people, being 50 Nuns, 30 orphans and about 26 women boarders. Fire broke out early this morning necessitating the ringing of a double alarm and before it could be brought under control the St. Hubert street wing of the building was destroyed. Two of the inmates and three firemen were slightly injured during the fire.

At present the amount of the damage could not be ascertained and it is not known how the fire originated.
