5 STARS HEAD CAST OF WARNER COMEDY

With a cast headed by five of Hollywood's brightest stars, namely, Ann Sheridan, Dennis Morgan, Jack Carson, Alexis Smith, Warner Bros. "One More Tomorrow," a sophisticated comedy of modern romance, opened last night at the Capitol Theatre.

Based on a Philip Barry play, "One More Tomorrow" tells the sometimes gay, sometimes poignant story of a handful of bright young people whose energies are directed into publishing a liberal magazine.

Their problems - both professional and amorous - are many, and it is only after near failure that the publishing venture and the tangled romantic affairs are satisfactorily ironed out.

Supporting the five stars is an excellent company of players including Reginald Gardner, John Loder, Margie Gateson, Thurston Hall, John Abbott and others.

Directed by Benjamin Glazer, the film was directed by Peter Godfrey. Charles Hoffman and Catherine Turvey were responsible for the screenplay with additional dialogue being contributed by Julius J. and Philip G. Epstein.

In his concluding remarks he reviewed the record of the C.C.F. Government in Saskatchewan and stated that they have reduced the provincial debt while greatly increasing the social services of the province. Following his talk there was a question period.

His son, a most promising young man, was killed in the war and the Primate and Mrs. Owen faced this tragedy with courage and Christian fortitude and by their attitude helped many other parents to bear the sacrifice of loved ones."

"One of the privileges of one's life was to call him friend—and this was true of so many for his friends were legion. It was a joy for me to work under him in the Toronto diocese for many years."

"He preached at my enthronement as Bishop of Algoma and two years ago he visited us in Halifax and preached the synod sermon in All Saints' Cathedral. All Anglicans in this diocese will mourn the loss of a true friend as well as a most distinguished primate and archbishop."

Halifax, April 9—(CP)—Rev. G. F. Kingston, Bishop of Nova Scotia, tonight paid tribute to Most Rev. Derwin T. Owen primate of the Church of England in Canada, who died today at Toronto, as "an outstanding spiritual leader in Canada... a great primate... a great citizen of Canada."

Bishop Kingston said: "Archbishop Owen has been an outstanding spiritual leader in Canada. He was respected and beloved not only by all members of the Church of England from coast to coast but by people of all denominations because of his wise leadership in the church and his helpful utterances."

He pointed out that during the war there was a measure of socialist planning of national life but that since the war the controls of the economy have been handed back to those who held them before the war. In a complex society controls are inevitable and a nation cannot be carried on without controls any more than the Ford automobile business could operate without planning of production and distribution. But he stressed "We are not getting rid of controls, they are only being handed back to the capitalists." Capitalism, he declared, means only a subsistence level for the workers and producers while today the great

Maritime Director Of C. C. F. Speaks At Summerside

Mr. Fred C. Young, Maritime director of the C.C.F. addressed a public meeting in the Summerside Town Hall last evening. About half of those attending were from the rural areas surrounding the town. Mr. Irving Toombs, Bedouque, presided and introduced the speakers. Mr. Douglas MacBrien, provincial organizer also spoke.

In his opening remarks Mr. Young said that people should examine new ideas but think their way through before adopting them. That is all C.C.F. asks, he said, but they feel sure that if the people do some real thinking the answer will be clear. He said living costs are rising steadily without the primary producer gaining anything by it, and at the same time the real income is dropping off. "It is the business of the Government to look out for the welfare of the people of the nation," he declared. "Government policies determine the social and economic condition of any nation."
