Seldom does a community sustain so great a loss as did Granville on February 4th when one of its most respected citizens, Alexander Falconer, was called home. He was the eldest son of the Hon. Hector Falconer, born in Sutherlandshire, Scotland, and at the age of 16 emigrated to this country with his parents in 1848. After serving with his father on the farm he became interested in railroad work and bridge-building, when he was soon recognized as an expert builder, and promoted to be inspector of masonry for some of the greatest structures in the lower provinces, having a first-class recommendation from such authority as Collingwood Schriber, he was accepted as inspector of masonry at the building of the Hillsborough Bridge where he proved himself eminently worthy of the confidence reposed in him. In the home he was a genial and hospitable host, a devoted husband, and an affectionate father. In secular matters in the community he enjoyed a deep interest always assisting and supporting anything that appealed to him as for the advancement of the place, and people. But in spiritual matters were his chief delight, and highest ambitions. He was an elder and active worker in the Presbyterian Church. Being a good Gaelic reader and singer he always acted as precursor for the Gaelic services during communion season, and this was the last act of service demanded of him by the Master. After assisting and presenting at Communion on Sabbath July 20th, he came home feeling ill, and despite the best medical skill, and tender nursing, he gradually grew worse, and although suffering extremely at times for nearly seven months he never murmured or complained, and at last passed away in calmness and serenity of spirit, a tranquility in the blood of Christ which keeps the souls of believers in their latest hour, even as a garson keeps a city.--Com.

After the prorogation yesterday afternoon the members of the Opposition met in their room and presented their leader, Mr. Mathieson, with a handsome gold-headed cane in recognition of his services during the session. The presentation was made by Mr. Morson who in very hearty terms expressed the appreciation of himself and his colleagues for the able, efficient and resourceful manner in which their leader had discharged his duties during the session. Mr. Mathieson gratefully expressed his thanks for the gift and his great pleasure in realizing the motives that prompted its bestowal.

Sorrow came to many hearts when it was learned that on the morning of March 19th Alfred McGregor had passed away. Mr. McGregor was born on January 4th 1853, at Lot 48, Queen's County, and received his education in the common school and Prince of Wales College Charlottetown. He passed the necessary examinations to obtain a teachers license at the age of 15 years, and entered into his profession by taking charge of the school at Southport. After teaching for some time he enlisted in the Scots Guards, and crossed to England. Having spent three years in the service he returned home, and took charge of Pownal school where he taught for several terms with much acceptance. While teaching in this school he organized the boys brigade and drilled the boys of the school in military exercises. Resigning this position he went to St. John, N. B., and engaged in mercantile business, but owing to ill health he was compelled to return to his home. His health having improved he obtained a position in the Government Land Office in Charlottetown, but was again compelled on account of failing health to rest. He came to his home in Alexandria and everything possible was done to restore him to health but without avail. He gradually grew weaker, and after a few months suffering became with Christian resignation, he passed away being endowed with a kind heart and a genial spirit he readily made friends of all with whom he met. He was converted two years ago in special services conducted by Rev. D. R. Chown in the Methodist Church at Pownal, and soon after united with the Baptist Church at Alexandria. He lived a consistent Christian life and died trusting in the merits of his redeemer. His remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at Alexandria. The boys brigade in uniform, under the command of Major Jones, led the procession from the church to the grave. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. E. A. McPhee assisted by Rev. D. R. Chown. He leaves to mourn his mother, one sister and two brothers, also his grand parents with whom he made his home from childhood, and a large circle of relatives and friends, for whom much sympathy is felt.--Com.
