TWO WOMEN AND MAN MURDERED AT CANTON, OHIO CANTON, Ohio, Aug 31—Two women and a man were murdered and another man wounded here, early today by an unknown man, who lay in wait for his victims and struck them down with an iron bar as they entered the house. 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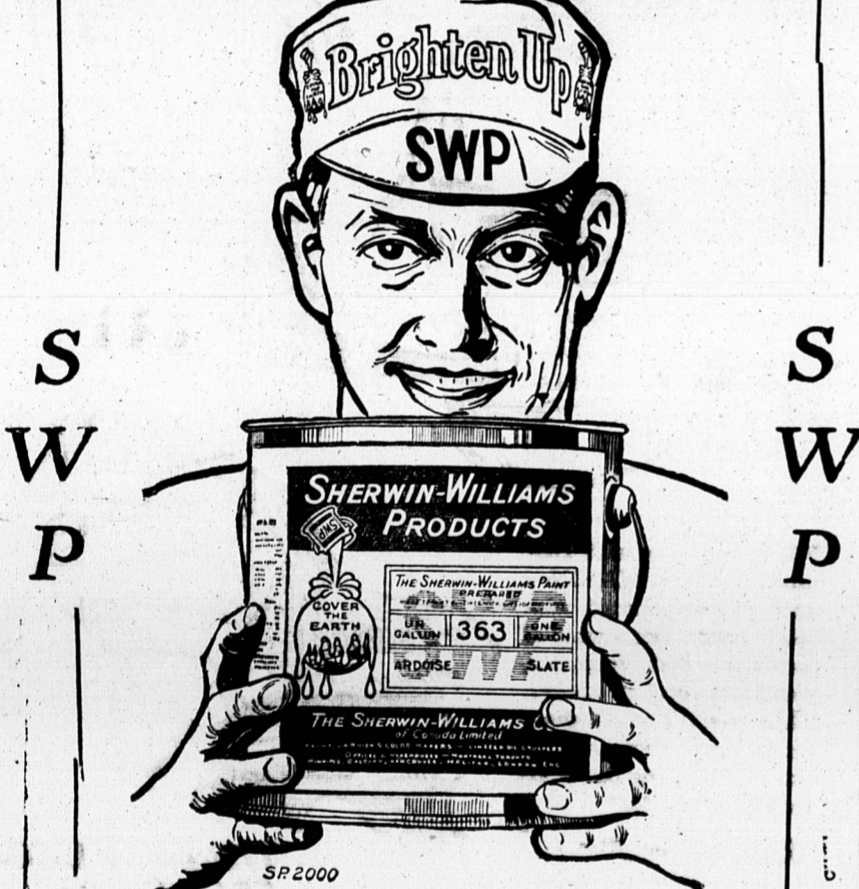
