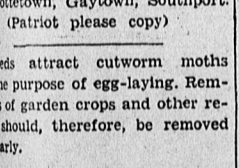

Fate Of Hawks Still In Doubt

Final Meeting To Be Held Today In An Effort To Bring About Satisfactory Settlement.

B., May 7—The fate of the Moncton Hawks, Allan Cup champions, whether they will remain intact or will be disbanded will probably be made known tomorrow, it was stated here tonight. At a meeting of the City Council tonight, to whom the Moncton Exhibition Association, Limited, had requested a revision in rental of the Stadium for the coming year, a motion was passed unanimously to the effect the Council cannot "acquiesce in the request" and that if the Association adhere to their intention of winding up their affairs, they be requested to surrender the lease.

JOCKEYS ARE BASEBALL SUSPENDED FOR RESULTS FOUL RIDING

As News-reel Picture Shows Riders of Two First Horses of Derby Guilty of Rough Riding.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 8—Obvious fouling on the part of both the leading jockeys, with Broker's Tip apparently the best horse, was disclosed today by a news-reel picture in a vivid camera description of the Kentucky Derby run Saturday.

The pictures showed Herbie Fisher, Toronto jockey, up on Head Play, apparently the first offender in the wild ride down the home stretch. He grabbed the saddle cloth of Broker's Tip when jockey Don Meade drove Col Bradley's ultimate winner through on the rail at the head of stretch.

Twice Broker's Tip pulled away from his rival, only to have his pace retarded by Fisher again snatching the saddle cloth. Meade, who served his early apprenticeship on Winnipeg tracks, retaliated by grabbing Fisher by the shoulder as the two horses battled stride for stride through the final sixteenth.

Near the finish Fisher struck Meade over the head with his whip and both jockeys were grabbing at the other's saddle cloth as Broker's Tip crossed the finish line, inches in front.

The Board of Stewards acted on the rough riding tactics today, setting Meade down for 30 days and Fisher for 35. The additional five days was given Fisher for striking Meade after the race.

HALIFAX, May 8—Four rounds of wild slugging, punctuated by seven knockdowns, preceded a clean-cut knockout tonight as "Tiger" Warrington, 175 pound Liverpool, N. S., colored boy, took the measure of Leo "Twin" Asselin, billed as the lightweight champion of Maine.

After a fairly even first round Warrington came out to floor Asselin four times in the second, the Maine boy taking nine counts on three occasions. Asselin however, could take it, and came back for more. He hit the resin twice in the third, started a shortlived rally in the fifth, and was out cold when seconds tossed in a towel. The formality of a count was unnecessary anyway.

Clyde McInnis won the six round opener over Larry Brown, and Walter Schultz was given the palm over Joe Holt in a close semi-final.

much that has been accomplished to clear away the cause of friction between nations prior to the London Economic Conference.

Its source lay in word from Paris that the French Cabinet had voted unanimously against paying the defaulted \$19,000,000 December interest without assurance the June 15 payment of \$40,000,000 would be postponed. From London, too, came indications that Great Britain might insist upon postponement as the price of joining in the tariff truce suggested by President Roosevelt.

LONDON, May 8—(A.P.)—Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade told Norman H. Davis, United States Ambassador-at-Large, at a prolonged conference today that he could see no "insurmountable obstacles" in the way of America's tariff truce proposal.

In the House of Commons Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald indicated that the fate of the proposal rested with the safeguards which the Government has asked to protect Britain's tariff position. In his conversation with Mr. Davis, the President of the Board of Trade, promised he would take it up at once with his Cabinet colleagues. His statement that he could see no "insurmountable obstacles" was a personal judgment, it was said in authoritative quarters.

The Prime Minister was understood to have discussed the whole project with the King in a conference this afternoon.

In Canada, among those to receive such honors is F. W. Freeman, regional organizer of first aid, Atlantic Region, Canadian National Railways, who is today in receipt of a summons to attend at Government House, Ottawa on this date for the purpose of receiving the badge of serving brother of the order. He has received the miniature badge which has the white eight pointed cross of the order on a black field, mounted in silver, and suspended by a black ribbon. Regulations covering the conferring of the honor of serving brother of the order of St. John require a total of twelve to fifteen years voluntary service and the decorations are to be born along with similar other honors. The work of the St. John Ambulance Association was commenced in Canada in 1905 and in 1910 a delegate from the Order of St. John came over to Canada from England and formed the Canadian branch of the St. John Ambulance Association under a Canadian charter putting the brigade on a permanent footing in this country.
