

Track Records Smashed At S' Side Meet

Trotting, Pacing Records Lowered; Close Finishes

A perfect afternoon for racing and an attendance of 1,200 enthusiastic race-goers saw some record breaking on a grand scale over the new Summerside race track yesterday.

The entry list was a good one and one class had a fine start. Some of the horses were in competition for the first time and some of the drivers were also making their debut.

The very first heat in the No. 1 Classified Trot and Pace was a thriller ending in a dead heat between the trotters Squire Hanover, 2:11, and the pacer Uscita Britton, 2:07. Everyone knew that it was a "scorching" but few were prepared for starter Doug MacLeod's announcement that it was trotted in 2:08, clipping three seconds off the track record of 2:11 set up by Squire Hanover Dominon Day. The next two heats were almost equally as fast, 2:08 1-2, 2:08 1-4.

There was another surprise waiting for the spectators when the four-year-old pacer, Hilda Budlong (2) 2:20 1-4 heading Lady Hal in a terrific drive to the wire was announced the winner in 2:12 1-2, a new track pacing record—in fact the fastest ever paced either over the old or new Summerside track. This race was into a four heat affair with the almost unnoticed Bonnie Scott, the first two heats, winning the third and the final. The racing was so strenuous in the second heat that the winner, reduced her record from 2:13 1-2 to 2:12 1-4.

In the No. 4 Classified Trot and Pace the winner turned out to be Peter Budlong, 2:02 3-4, that had little training until this spring and has come along quite fast. He took a record of 2:15 1-2 in the first heat—a very creditable performance for a 4-year-old.

No. 1 Classified Trot and Pace

Four trotters and two pacers faced the starter and got away on the fourth score with Squire Hanover out in front, Uscita Britton second, Watchman, second, Graton fourth, Playdale, fifth and Millie Kalmuck, who got away badly, sixth. There was very little change in the positions in the last quarter when Watchman started to move up and entering the home stretch was closing fast on the leaders. Halfway down he passed Uscita Britton, then came with a rush and finished in a dead heat with Squire Hanover who was getting a great drive from the driver, Uscita Britton, who came close third, Bedford Graton fourth, Playdale fifth, Millie Kalmuck fifth, Playdale sixth. Time 2:08—truly a wonderful performance for both trotters and for Squire Hanover.

The second heat was similar to the first but Watchman just managed to catch Squire Hanover, who was in front from the wire and necked to the goal with the others in the same positions as the first heat. Time 2:08 1-2—another scizzling heat.

The third heat Watchman was back in third horse place at the three-quarter pole but driver McArthur cut him loose and he started to move up, first on Uscita Britton, then collaring Squire Hanover about six lengths from the wire to finish half a length to the good. Millie Kalmuck, who had started disappointingly in the first two heats, went a wonderful mile in third beat at Squire Hanover's lead and certainly going better than in the first two heats. Time 2:10. Uscita Britton fourth, Playdale fifth and Bedford Graton sixth. Playdale went his best mile of the season in the third, a lot of speed in spite of showing 2:08 1-4—Watchman's best quarter-mile was trotted in 29 1-2 seconds.

No. 2 Classified Trot and Pace

Four trotters and the pacer Wait N See were the starters in what proved to be a hard fought contest. In the first heat the finish between George Mac, the winner, Scottie Watson and Ruby Volo was a very close one with Beverdale fourth, Wait N See fifth. Time 2:16 1-2.

In the second heat Scottie Watson came with a rush through the stretch to nose out George Mac with Ruby Volo a close third, Beverdale fourth and Wait N See fifth. Time 2:16.

In the third heat Beverdale grabbed the pole shortly after the "go" and trotted beautifully for owner-driver Clarke till half way down the home stretch when he made a break and was passed by Scottie Watson and George Mac with Ruby Volo, who made a bid break going away, fourth, and Wait N See fifth. Time 2:14 1-2—was the fastest of the race and a new record for Scottie Watson.

No. 3 Classified Trot and Pace

There were seven starters in this class, all pacers and it was a rather hard field to get away. When they did get "go" Silent Mac was in front, Silent Sam second, Jack Clyde third and Lady Hal fourth. At the half Hilda Budlong had moved up to fourth place. When they turned into the stretch for home it was Silent Mac, Jack Clyde, Silent Sam, Bonnie Scott, with the others strung out. All the drivers were teaming frantically but Hilda, with the driver, Schuman, held off driver McNeill's best attempt with Lady Hal, finishing a neck to the good in 2:11 1-2—a new track pacing record. Lady Hal was in better than 2:12 and Jack Clyde must have paced in 2:13.

In the second heat driver McNeill made one of his well-timed finish drives with Lady Hal and nipped Hilda Budlong a few yards from the finish in a real exciting finish. Jack Clyde again was a close third and Bonnie Scott back two lengths, fourth, Graton Queen fifth. Time 2:12 1-4. A new record for Lady Hal.

In the third heat Bonnie Scott got away driving Kelly and crouched low to keep down wind, resistance and encouraging the daughter of Scotland 1:59 1-2 all season 6-2; Mrs. Waugh and Mr. Wran were also defeated by Gwen Rogers and Frank Hansen 6-1 and though they tried very hard—6-3.

Dodgers Win 2 1-2 Hour Struggle From Cubs 10-5

NEWARK, N. J., July 15—(AP)—Newark Bears, International League leaders, handed Baltimore Orioles a 2-3 lambasting today in a wild and woolly game that reached an early climax when the Bears scored seven runs in the third inning on only one hit.

Seven home runs exploded off the bats of Newark hitters—three by infielder Hank Majeski—tying the league record set by the Orioles themselves in 1930. The 23-run total equaled the Newark club record made in 1937.

Six errors and nine bases on balls contributed to the scoring for the Bears, who had only a 14-13 edge in hits.

NEW YORK, July 15—(AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers and Chicago Cubs staged a stormy struggle today with the Dodgers emerging from what their fans would call a "snub" on the long end of a 10-5 count at Chicago.

By any name it was a wild afternoon, with the Dodger jockeys giving five Chicago hurters a rough riding from the outset as well as making 13 hits.

The Cubs were so unsettled that they made five errors and in the fifth inning when Hiram Blanton was removed from the mound he threw the ball at the Brooklyn benchwarmers. The Bruins further showed their spirit by battling every step of the way, even though they were beaten to all intents and purposes when Claude Passeau was driven out of the box in the third inning.

When they were trailing 5-0 in the fourth Lou Novikoff and Jimmie Foxx blasted successive home runs and even in the eighth, beat-out 10-8, the Cubs managed to knock out Kirby Highte.

Braves Break Reds Jinx

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Expanding in the sixth inning of the nightcap for seven runs and a 9-4 victory, the Cardinals blasted Philadelphia in both ends of a doubleheader played at home for the benefit of the tuberculosis society of St. Louis. The Cards won the opener 7-3.

BOSTON, July 15—(AP)—Whirlaway buried Seabiscuit's all-time money winning record deep in Suffolk Downs "graveyard of champions" today with a streak of lightning speed.

Taking over the Biscuit's throne as the world champion brad winner of the turf, the long-tailed Kentucky Cannonball turned loose his "crusher" kick in one burst of running power to come from almost out of sight and win the rich Massachusetts Handicap faster than it ever has been done before.

And with the \$43,650 he won as he zipped across the finish line, the colt they used to call crazy added enough to his earnings to give him a total of \$451,333 for his 2 1-2 years of racing, thereby wiping out the \$437,730 mark the Biscuit took so long to pile up a few years back.

Smith went the distance in the first game and was doing fairly well until the Red Sox combined hitting and two Chicago errors for a total of seven runs in the eighth inning. Until that frame they had struck out three times.

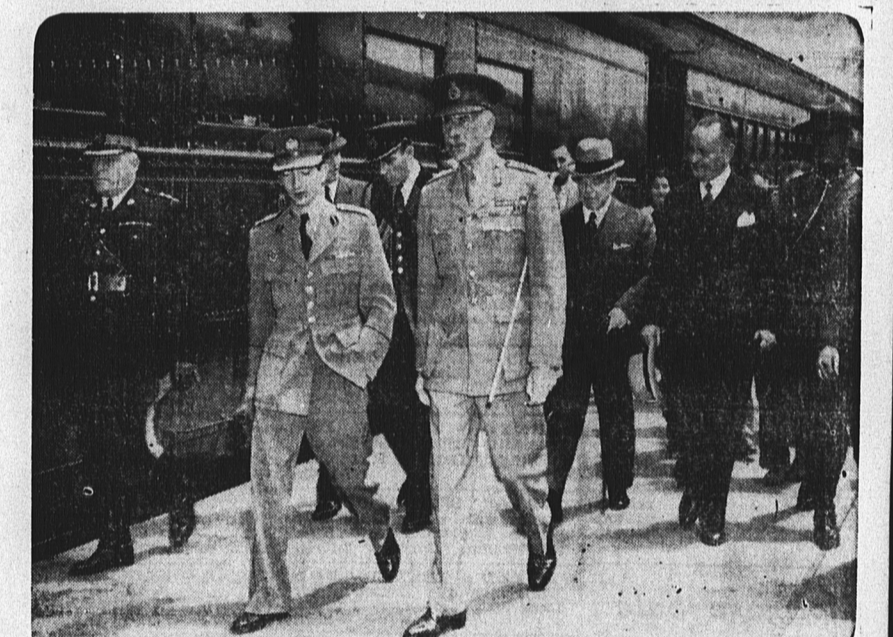
