JULES VEDRINE INJURED IN FALL FROM AIRSHIP.

PARIS, April 29—Jules Vedrine, the most famous and most popular aviator of France, is probably fatally injured as a result of a fall with his monoplane this morning at St. Denis a suburb of Paris, while flying from Douai, in the Department of the Nord to Madrid.

Vedrine was ambitious of creating a new aerial record by flying from Brussels, Belgium, to Madrid, Spain, in twenty-four hours. He started from Paris last Thursday in his Deperdussis monoplane, but owing to motor troubles decided not to proceed farther than Douai a distance of about 117 miles, which he completed in one hour and forty minutes. This morning he had succeeded in getting his motor into proper working order again and decided to start on his flight from Douai to Madrid where the population was preparing a great reception for him. He was seen flying over St. Denis, a suburb of the eastern suburb of Paris, where he made a rapid descent from a height of 600 feet.

Accounts differ as to the cause of the accident. Some of the spectators say that the monoplane struck the telegraph wires along the railroad track and that Vedrine was thrown out of the machine on the rails. According to another account, a passing train hit the monoplane as Vedrine was about to land in order to rectify a defect in his motor. The aviator when picked up was found to have sustained a fractured skull. He was placed on a train and conveyed to Paris where he was taken to a hospital and the operation of trepanning the skull was immediately performed, but his condition is believed to be hopeless.

THE SEARCH FOR LIQUID CAUSES SOME TROUBLE IN AMHERST.

AMHERST, April 29—There is quite a sensation in police circles in Amherst today. This week Leo Bradshaw, a prominent market man, had an information laid against him by Inspector Carter on a charge of violating the Canada Temperance act. The case was postponed from Friday last until Tuesday afternoon of this week. Early Sunday morning Policeman Helm was on his rounds on the main street of the town and saw a light in Bradshaw's house. He was trying the door to ascertain if it was locked when the proprietor suddenly put in an appearance. Policeman Helm says that Bradshaw and two of his friends assaulted him. What the other side of the story is has not yet been divulged, but Helm's face is rather badly disfigured. Bradshaw was placed under arrest today and gave bonds for \$500 for appearance for trial on Wednesday.

AMHERST, April, 29.—An accident occurred at Amherst station last evening which will probably result in Albert Collins a well-known citizen of this town, losing his arm. Mr. Collins returned to Amherst by an immigration special and jumped from the car step while the train was in motion. He lost his balance and one arm went on the track, the car wheels passing over it and crushing the bones. As soon as he was discovered help was summoned and he was taken to the hospital.

MUST BE LEFT WITH THE CANADIAN LAW.

WASHINGTON, April 30—Owing to the absence of a treaty with Great Britain covering the disposition of the effects of American citizens who die on a British ship on the high seas it probably will be impossible for the state department to directly assist the relatives of American victims of the Titanic disaster to obtain possession of any valuables found on the recovered bodies brought to Halifax. The property must be dealt with under Canadian law which probably means that it will be necessary for the relatives and friends of the deceased to go to the Canadian courts to obtain the property to which they lay claim.

OTTAWA, April 29.—It is learned that some important changes in the personnel of the Roblin Government in Manitoba are likely to be announced shortly. The dispatch sent out a few days ago that Hon. J. R. Caldwell, Provincial Minister of Education, will be called to fill the recently created new King's Bench Judgeship is practically confirmed in Ministerial circles here. This position, it is understood, was originally created to provide Hon. Hugh John Macdonald with a reward for his services to the party, but the latter was declined the honor, and it is now almost definitely settled that the present Minister of Education will receive the position.

MONTREAL, April 29.—A canon which has prevailed in the Catholic Cemetery for years, the burial of the dead on Sundays, will be discontinued next month. Notices were read from the pulpits of all the Catholic churches yesterday that the Cemetery will be closed on Sundays and on all religious holidays. There are two thousand bodies in the large vault of the cemetery waiting burial, and relatives were requested by the priests to attend to the necessary details of burial at once. Last year one hundred and fifty bodies which had been placed in the vault during the winter were deserted by friends and relatives and had to be buried at the expense of the church.
