### WHITNEY WANTS TO BUY VOLDYOVSKI.

NEW YORK, June 11.—The London correspondent of the World says that William C. Whitney of New York, who leased Volodyovski, the English Derby winner, from Lady Meux, is extremely anxious to buy the colt, and has offered her \$75,000 cash besides the \$45,000 which represents \$20,000 for the rental the year and \$20,000, one half of the Derby winnings, or Lady Meux's share, in case the horse won. Mr. Whitney's lease of the horse does not expire until the fall of 1902.
