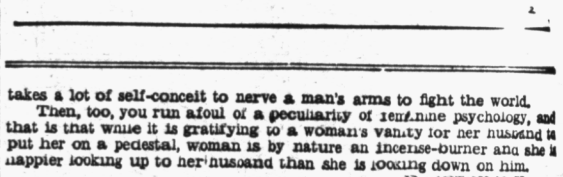

LOVELY COLORED GLASS

Some of the daintiest touches in the home can be introduced by the use of colored glass — not only for the dining table, where tumblers and wineglasses — and possibly small plates for tea and dessert are matched up with the coloring of the dinner service, but for all sorts of other dainty accessories. A shallow bowl of amber crackle glass is an ideal setting for golden daffodils or yellow tulips, the flowers being held firmly in a glass holder of amber tone to match. All sorts of quaint vases made of tinted glass — some of the translucent blue-green of sea water, some glowing with the tints of the rainbow, and others merging from deep smoky grey-blues to glowing reds or palest greens, bring a fascinating modern note to a room. Their shapes are diverse — but quite often a vase will look as if it had almost aspired to be a jug until the spout was coaxed into a more generous curve by the hand of a master moulder and its handle was almost snatched away.

Like Tortoiseshell

Glass which looks like tortoiseshell is delightful for the modern dressing table, the large diagonal corner pin tray, the amusingly foreshortened perfume bottle and the powder bowl all being made of the richly-toned glass, with a pair of squat candlesticks to match for standing on the bedroom mantelpiece. There is an opaque jade colored glass which is used in the same way and looks particularly well in a bedroom furnished with lined oak. Colored glass of the kinds makes a lovely medium for the bowls of table lamps, which can be chosen to accentuate the main color note of the room. Some have deeply ridged bowls, the ridges causing the glass to have a pleasing shaded effect, some gleam like a finely cut crystal, while others have a modern theme painted or lightly engraved on to their surface.

Grandmother's Quilt Patterns

THE COOK'S CORNER. Pineapple De Luxe Pie. 1/2 cup sugar, 4 tablespoons flour, 2 egg yolks, 1 cup boiling water, 1 cup finely diced fresh or canned pineapple, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 egg whites, 3 tablespoons brown sugar. Mix together the sugar, flour and egg yolks. Pour the boiling water over this mixture slowly. Cook in double boiler until the mixture thickens, stirring constantly. Add the pineapple and butter. When cool put in the baked shell, which is made as follows: Pie Crust. 1/2 cup shelled almonds, 20 large graham crackers, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup melted butter, 1-2 cup light cream or milk. Grind the shelled almonds and mix with the graham crackers, which have been finely ground. Add the liquid and press the mixture into the pie plate. Bake in a slow oven (325 degrees F.) until it is a golden brown; about ten minutes. The pie may be topped with meringue made of the egg whites and three tablespoons of brown sugar, or it may be served with whipped cream. Tapioca Banana Pie. 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, Pinch of salt, 2 cups milk, 1 egg, 1 tablespoon cold water, 2-3 cup sugar, 3 bananas, Coconut, Large baked pie shell. Bake a custard by cooking 15

Paris is fitting hips quite snugly these days and giving a slim line to the waistline, as in the charmingly feminine shirtwaist style for today's pattern. In the printed and plain toning silk crepe combination it is adorable. It is also smart carried out in one material as in plain or patterned crepe silk. Lightweight woolsens, necktie silks, rayons, etc., are also lovely for this model. Style No. 996 is designed for sizes 14, 16, 18 years, 36, 38 and 40 inches bust. Size 16 requires 2 1/2 yards 39-inch material for skirt with 1 1/2 yards 39-inch for waist. Price of PATTERN 15 cents in stamps or coin (coin is preferred). Wrap coin carefully. No. 996. Size. Name. Street, Address. City, State. minutes in double boiler tapioca, salt and milk, stirring frequently. Then mix together yolk of egg, tablespoon of water and one-half cup sugar. Gradually add this to hot mixture. Cook until thick. Then remove the fire and cool. Line pie crust with sliced bananas, pour some tapioca mixture over them, then alternate layer of bananas and tapioca mixture until the pie crust is filled. Beat white of egg until stiff, add sugar to sweeten. Use as meringue, sprinkle coconut on top and brown well in slow oven.
