**Condemned Man Put to Death By Lethal Gas**  
(Canadian Press.) STAFFS PRISON, Carson City, Nevada, May 22.—Nevada made forfeit the life of a murderer yesterday by lethal gas, this commonwealth's form of capital punishment. Stanku Jukich, 26, copper miner of Reno, Nevada, was the man who paid the extreme penalty. The law demanded his death for the slaying last year of Jennie Madok, his 16 year old sweetheart. The spark of life vanished quickly from the body of the condemned man. Four nodes of the head, stretched over a period of two and a half minutes, told a story of the effectiveness of the hydrocyanic acid sprayed into the concrete death vault in which Jukich sat strapped to a chair.

**Grave Fears For Recovery of Evangeline Booth**  
(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, May 22.—Grave apprehension was felt today over the condition of Commander Evangeline Booth, of the Salvation Army, who is critically ill with appendicitis at her home near White Plains. Although an operation is urgent, her physician stated "the various complications leave the likelihood of recovery too much in doubt to warrant it."

**Ratification Expected Early In June**  
(Special to the Guardian.) NEW YORK, N.Y., May 22.—Henry Berenger, French Ambassador to the U.S., called for Paris today predicting that the French debt agreement with his country would be ratified at a conference early in June. Berenger was as proud as a schoolboy over the fact that he had written and given out his first statement in English. He rattled off as promptly as he intends to urge that it be, he said he would return during the latter part of June but otherwise not until September.

Start sweet peas outside if you can work the ground, indoors in pots or boxes if you can't. The only way to have good sweet peas is to get them blooming in May.

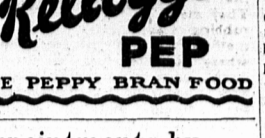
You should be cutting your own French endive from a box in the cellar instead of paying its weight in gold for it. It is as easy to grow as a pansy. Plant the seed early.

er," and then came the message from John 10: 16—"And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold; them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice, and there shall be one fold, and one shepherd." Christ came and instituted an organism—not a mere organization. This organism is the Church. When you spit into the face of Jesus Christ, strong language out of a fat, nevertheless, Jesus said—"Saul! Saul! why persecutest thou me?" What did Jesus mean? He meant that His Church and Himself are one, and the man who attacks and persecutes and scorns the members of His body—the Church—that man makes an onslaught on the Christ Himself.

Now then, there is one shepherd and there is one fold; and you get down your Bibles and read them and find out what Jesus Himself says about the Church; about Church membership; about confession of Christ. Christianity is ONE. One is origin, one in purpose, one in finality.

Now start at the right place. What is that place? The answer is Jesus Christ. Jesus is the Shepherd. Do you want shepherding? Do you want comfort? Do you want protection? Then you must have Jesus the Shepherd.

(Mark down this passage—Matthew 16: 18. "On his rock I will build my Church." Christ is the foundation of the church. Christ is the rock. Be sure of your foundation. Be sure you avoid the sand as a base to build where the storm will beat down every thing you erected.

Do you believe that Jesus is the Christ (the Son of the Living God)? Do you believe that? The creed of the sheepfold is Jesus Christ. That is the basis of unity, the foundation of church union. Christ is the centre and circumference of the whole Christian system. There is no weird and tangled language in the vocabulary of this man Jesus "I am the way," says Jesus. There is no ambiguity about this saying. Jesus is the way in. Jesus the way into the Church, Jesus the way home.

Does water save you? Does baptism save? Oh no! You can make a fetish of the most sacred things. God only can save you; and He does save you through Jesus Christ. It is your business to obey Jesus Christ, and that is your supreme business. A surrendered heart, and then you will know all you need to know. And that is your trouble. Your heart is the seat of all your difficulties. Let go and let God. Let go and the great transaction is done. Salvation is not a matter of proxy; salvation is a personal matter.

"Go make disciples"—never mind tacking on some foreign label to that word, disciples. Disciples! Isn't that enough? Why add or take away! Christian! Isn't that sufficient? Why load Christianity with unnecessary accessories—vestibular junk of man's invention? Christianity is just Christ. One Christ! One Shepherd! One Sheepfold! One simple, compelling, compelling, all-pervasive personality—Jesus Christ—Son of the Living God. Accept Him, obey Him, and the problems of life are solved and salvation, here and hereafter, is yours.

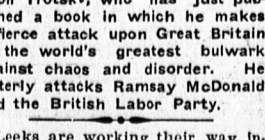

When General Wolfe sailed down the St. Lawrence River in the night before the siege of Quebec, he paced up and down in the prow of his vessel. He had conceived his plan for the scaling of the heights of Abraham. Every man knew the task which had been assigned to him, and as they glided over the still waters of the St. Lawrence, Wolfe was heard to repeat over and over again that stanza from Grey's immortal elegy

"The boast of heraldry, the pomp of power  
And all that beauty, all that wealth e'er gave,  
Await alike the inevitable hour  
The paths of glory lead but to the grave."

Let not then the pomp and pageantry of another Empire Day divert our thoughts from realizing the truth "That here we have no continuing city. We are but pilgrims and sojourners as all our fathers were before us. Yet this is not for despondency, no, it is even to inspire a nobler effort in the sphere where God has placed us recognizing that the stability of the Empire and the throne rests as much upon our shoulders as upon him who was crowned in Westminster on the 22nd of June, 1911.

**City Must Gather In Arrears or Close Schools**  
SYDNEY, N. S., May 23.—Preparations are going forward at City Hall for the biggest tax drive in the history of the city. "It's a question of collecting the back taxes or closing the schools," declared a high city official discussing the outlook. "and the council has ordered the necessary steps to get the money in." The total amount of back taxes outstanding for 1924 and 1925 is approximately \$225,000. In addition there is outstanding \$300,000 in water rates.

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
