AWFUL TRAGEDY ON BOSTON ELEVATED

Crowded Passenger Car Plunged Through Open Drawbridge and from Thirty to Forty Lives Were Lost.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) BOSTON, November 8.—The lives of from thirty to forty persons were lost last night when a crowded passenger car of the Boston Elevated Street Railway plunged through an open drawbridge into Fort Point channel, just outside the South Station terminal.

U. S. ELECTION STILL IN DOUBT BOTH SIDES CLAIM VICTORY

Latest Returns from the Electoral College, Following Numerous Contradictory Statements Give Wilson 232, Hughes 239 Electoral College Votes with 60 Doubtful.

STEAMER ARABIA SUNK UNWARNED

437 Passengers Including 169 Women and Children Saved by Other Vessels. Two Members of Crew Lost.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Peninsular and Oriental Liners Arabia, received warning from the submarine which sank her in the Mediterranean on Monday, according to a statement issued this morning by the Admiralty. All the 437 passengers, including 169 women and children, and all the crew, with the exception of two engineers, who were killed by the explosion, were saved by vessels which went to the rescue.

Mackensen Caught In trap Military Critics Declare

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Field Marshal von Mackensen has been caught in his own trap in the Dobrudja, according to the opinion of military observers in London. To be sure, he can withdraw his forces to the south without any great loss. But he will find it almost impossible to advance. An invasion of Russia through Besarabia is out of the question. The whole northern frontier of the Dobrudja is a tangle of marshes, swamps, lakes and islands formed by the delta of the Danube. The strip of land south of the river, from the Black Sea to Galatz and Braila, is one of the most desolate regions in the world.

American Steamer Sunk Unwarned

(Special to the Guardian.) NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The American Hawaiian Steamship Company's vessel, the Columbian, was sunk without warning. She is under American registry, is a freighter carrying no passengers and a crew of about 113 officers and men, according to the officers of the company. She was under charter by the France-Canada S. S. Company with offices here. She was a sister ship to the Kansas which the German submarine U-53 held up off Nantuxett a few weeks ago.

S.S. Rappahannock Long Overdue

(Canadian Press Despatch.) HALIFAX, November 8.—Much uneasiness is felt regarding the Furness-Withy steamship Rappahannock which sailed from Halifax for London twenty-two days ago. The greater part of the Rappahannock's cargo was apples. She has been considered the best apple carrying ship sailing out of Halifax, and has the record of landing cargoes in much better condition than any other steamer except, perhaps, the Kanawha, a sister ship.

Five United States Vote Out Saloon

(Special to the Guardian.) COLUMBUS, OHIO, Nov. 8.—Headquarters of the anti-saloon league at Westerville, a suburb of Columbus, today reported it had information that the dry forces had won state wide prohibition fights in five states at yesterday's election. The states named were Michigan, Montana, South Dakota, Utah and Nebraska. In Michigan the saloon was voted out by a majority of 80,000.

German Review Of West Front

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—The German headquarters has issued the following review of the situation on the Western front: "The first great thrust of the Entente offensive in July surpassed German expectations as to power and endurance, but it failed owing to the unparalleled aggression of the German troops, and our assailants gave up their intentions to break through in that direction. "Already in August the enemy had passed somewhat the unmethodical tactics of a general pressure against the whole front, which was as natural, brought only isolated advantages. In September the tactics of the enemy again were completely changed. By an undeniably increased pushing force he obtained an important gain in terrain, and, resuming his bold intention of breaking through, the enemy directed all his efforts against the top of the triangle and to gain some ground north of the Somme between that river and the Ancre. This meant the definite division of the general battle into two separate engagements. "The southern battle in the district of Blaches and Verdandovillers, after the failure of the idea to break through on a gain of terrain in the sector of Berry and Chaules in consequence of powerful local thrusts. These gains, however could not be extended owing to the heavy losses sustained by the attacking troops. "In the northern sector the weight of the common thrust succeeded in extending considerably the conquered triangle by the conquest of Gueucourt and further terrain, including Combles, during the battle of Sept. 25 to 27, but the aim of this unheard-of effort—the strategic breach of the lines at the top of the triangle—were not obtained in spite of murderous fighting beyond all human comprehension. "The unheard of Anglo-French efforts in the battles of October also finally failed as the result of the German resisting power, which certainly had increased enormously since the middle of September. "The result of the Somme battle, therefore, can be stated as follows: "The enemy did not succeed in breaking through the German lines. Neither did he crush the German forces which would have meant the shaking of the German west front. The ene-
