OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—Alleging a conspiracy against the people of Canada for the purpose of "looting the Canadian National Railways" handing them over to a private corporation together with the ultimate disposal of the Grand Trunk to "American Railway interests" Mr. C. G. MacNeill, Dominion secretary treasurer of the G. W. V. A. forwarded the following telegram to Messrs. Gouin, Meighen, King, Crerar and President of the Bank of Montreal and President of the C. P. R.: "I request your statement for ex-service men in Canada in regard to the allegation of conspiracy against the electorate of Canada as stated herein, originating from non-partisan sources, apparently substantiated by reliable evidence. The aims of organized ex-service men in disregard to partisan interests and demand a clean government and square deal."

Ask Rhodes Men To Found Fund

LONDON, Nov. 26.—At the last meeting of the American Club of Oxford University, a proposal was discussed to raise a scholarship fund among past and present American, British and Colonial Rhodes scholars for the purpose of sending Englishmen to universities in America and the British Dominions. It was learned today although no final action has been taken, the plans will probably be adopted. It is proposed to ask each of the thousand American and Colonial Rhodes scholars, past and present, to subscribe £15 to the fund, making a total of £15,000. The yearly interest of this will then be used to fund two scholarships of about £350 yearly, for three years to send one Englishman to the American or Canadian university of his choice and another to South Africa, Australia, or New Zealand university. These scholars must have had at least six terms at Oxford, and will be chosen in the same manner as American candidates to the Rhodes Scholarship are selected.

PELT CLEANING PLANT.—Something new in the fox business—a plant for the cleaning of pelts—has been opened up in the Bourke Windsor Service Station, Queen St., by Mr. F. H. Roper. The plant is equipped with two large revolving drums driven by an electric motor. In the first drum which is composed of close fitting staves is placed specially prepared sawdust imported from Montreal. The pelts are then put in and the drum starts revolving. The sawdust penetrates the skins, thoroughly cleanses them of grease and dirt. They are then transferred to the second drum built of woven wire, and when it revolves the sawdust is driven out of the pelts. They are then subjected to brushing and when the process is complete there is a remarkable transformation in their appearance.

Manliness Keynote of St. Andrew's Life

At Zion Church last evening an eloquent sermon was preached by Rev. G. C. Taylor upon the life of St. Andrew, Scotland's patron saint.

Reviewing the life of St. Andrew the preacher explained that his name in the original language meant "manliness." He was evidently a man who had thought the highest things, because he was a follower of the highest teacher of the day. John the Baptist whose teaching was Righteousness. John's teaching led him to Christ, and he lived and followed Him.
The whole life of St. Andrew is in telling men about Christ or in telling Christ about men. He was always a link between Christ and the people, as in the case when he brought his own brother to the Master, or when he brought the man with the loaves and fishes to the Master. His manly study might be fed. His manly devotion in his willingness, after bringing forward his brother, to take second place himself though he was Christ's first disciple.
Adapting his text to present day conditions the preacher emphasized the need in Canada of the manly virtues evident in the life of St. Andrew. There is much to hinder a man from reaching up to the noble thing. Self interest ties him down. Though we have escaped the chains of serfdom we are still tied down with the chains of convention and the fear of offending those who have the power to retaliate upon us. On the eve of the coming momentous election we should all strive to forget smaller political issues and be true to Canada first and foremost.

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PREM. MEIGHEN MAKES PLEA FOR FARMER

ORONTO, Nov. 26.—Immediately following a meeting in Newcastle, Premier Meighen, motored to Toronto and addressed a gathering in the Town Hall here today. It was his duty, he said to place the public issues before the people, he was not appealing on personal grounds. He failed to recall any campaign in which there was such a "reckless fusillade mendacity as this one." I do not know what to attribute this inherent dishonesty of campaign, started and continued by the Leader of the Opposition "said the Premier."

Mr. Meighen declared he could mention the names of many leading Liberals who wanted Hon. S. F. Tolmie to remain the Minister of Agriculture. Mr. Tolmie has done more for the Canadian Farmer than had been accomplished under any other Minister of Agriculture not excluding Mr. Crerar. Any Government that is discriminated against the farmers would not have brains enough to run a country. Mr. Meighen said, he declared that in all his political experience no government had ever tried to discriminate against an Agricultural community.

Political Meeting At St. Margaret's

(Continued from page 1.)

"IN MY JUDGMENT, THE EXPENDITURE OF A THOUSAND DOLLARS WILL BE SUFFICIENT TO COMPLETE, PROTECT AND PERPETUATE 'THE HARBOUR AT THE PLACE.' It is the most important fishing grounds on the north side of Prince Edward Island and any ordinary expenditure to establish a harbor for fishing boats at this place would, in my opinion, be well justified.
"I beg, therefore, to suggest that you instruct the Resident Engineer, Mr. Hundman, to make an immediate examination and report on this question, and I further suggest that if the small sum of money mentioned be found sufficient to do this work, that it be taken from the amount voted last session for unforeseen contingencies.
"It will be important that this work be done during the month of March next so that advantage may be taken of the spring frosts to still further deepen the entrance to the lake.
"I have the honor to be, Sir, Your obedient servant,
(Sgd) J. J. HUGHES."

The denial of this letter by Mr. Hughes may perhaps be taken as a fair sample of his venality," continued Mr. McIsaac amid tense silence.

Mr. Hughes in the ten minutes allotted to him at the conclusion of the meeting maintained that in the letter quoted by Mr. McIsaac he was simply pointing out to the Minister of Public Works that the break which the storm had caused in the harbour might be repaired for \$1,000 Mr. McIsaac had garbled the letter in reading it, he maintained.
"Mr. McIsaac. Here is a copy of your letter, read it for yourself."
Mr. Hughes. I wouldn't take your copy of it. It's been garbled.
(Mr. Hughes, however, took and retained the letter after he set down, picking it up from the reporter's table where it had been laid in front of him by Mr. McIsaac.)
Mr. D. J. Mullin, the third speaker at the meeting, criticized at some length the past actions of both political parties and urged the claims of the Progressive party. Mr. Crerar was a real farmer, he said, head of a farmers' corporation doing a \$25,000,000 business and his party is composed of educated, intelligent, practical farmers whose direct object it will be, if elected, to help along the interests of agriculture. He maintained his belief that the Liberals were not really in favor of reciprocity and never were. The Progressives do not propose free trade or reciprocity with the States but they are strongly in favor of it.
