THE MARKETS

MONTEREAL, Que., May 31.—Extreme dullness again marked the export trade in Canadian grain here today, there being practically no demand from foreign buyers. In sympathy with the break in prices for grain futures in other markets, a weaker feeling developed in the local market for cash grain and prices for Argentine and American corn were reduced one cent per bushel and Canadian western oats at 2 1/2 cents per bushel. Carlots of Argentine corn were quoted at \$1.04 and American sample corn at \$1.07, number 2 Canadian western oats at 76 cents and number 3 Canadian western at 72 cents per bushel. Owing to the decidedly weak feeling that developed in the cash wheat situation at Winnipeg, the local market for spring wheat grades of flour was weaker and prices were reduced twenty cents per barrel. First patents, sold at \$8.90, second patents at \$8.40 and strong bakers at \$8.20 per barrel. The export trade was quiet but the local demand was fair. A moderate amount of business was done in winter wheat flour and prices were steady. The market for millfeed was without any new feature to note, prices being steady with a fair business passing. The tone of the market for standard grades of rolled oats was firm at the late advance in prices noted. A fairly active business was done in eggs and values were unchanged. The receipts were 1840 cases. The potato market continued active and firm. Sales of carlots of New Brunswick Green Mountains were made at \$2.45 to \$2.50 per bag of sixty pounds.

Quebec white B grade at \$2.40 per bag and reds at \$2.00 to \$2.10 per bag of ninety pounds in bulk extract. The demand for butter showed no improvement but active and the undertone was easy. Eggs extras 23 to 29, firsts 25, prices were steady. Eastern townships No. 1 pasteurized was quoted, 1-4 to 18 1-2 cents per pound, 1-4 to 34 1-4 cents to 34 1-2 cents per receipt were 6,107 boxes. The receipts were 1,680 WINNIPEG—Dealers are in- ing country shippers for market. The cheese trade was firm. Western grades were quoted at 18 onds 22 to 23.
