Provinces "grew up with the library and inseparable from it." She referred in conclusion to a recently published book by Alvin Johnson entitled "The Public Library: The People's University" which has caused considerable discussion, and in which the author maintains that the time has come when the libraries should take their rightful place as centres for the adult education movement.

Voices Appreciation

Mr. H. H. Shaw, Provincial Superintendent of Education, warmly complimented Miss Bateson on her address and tendered the thanks and appreciation of the people of Prince Edward Island for her splendid service in establishing the Carnegie demonstration library here. "She has left a tradition that is going to be an inspiration to all the libraries which follow her," he declared amid applause.

Dr. Mansbridge

"The people who know are the people who govern, in the last resort, and they have done it in reality down through the years," said Dr. Mansbridge. "I believe that the sources of mental and spiritual power, however, are right manual labour. I am sure that the people whose lives are rooted in agriculture have made, are making and will continue to make the finest contributions to the thought and life of the world. I don't mean directly, necessarily. They may not even appear as the fruit of the tree; but they are surely the root of the tree."

to discover those gifts is by what we are interested in. The greater the increase of interest in adult education in any community," he said "the greater the power of that community and the greater its contribution to what we may call the peace of the world. That does not mean the cessation of war preparation for war. It means living in a right relationship, which it is impossible for me to define but which most people, or other our hearts must reach out to."

Morning Session

At yesterday's meeting in the Canadian Educational Program W. Dewar MacDougall, Principal of Normal Practice School, Edmonton, was the first speaker. He read a most informative paper on Education through activities. He explained the system pursued in his school, indicating that 50% of the time was devoted to practical instruction in arts and handicrafts, the other half to theoretical instruction. Mr. MacDougall had on exhibition arts and handicrafts, the work of the pupils of his school, and also read a number of letters from the school magazine to his pupils.

A general discussion followed, the consensus of opinion being that more attention should be given to practical instruction where such was being imparted. A question was asked by Mr. MacDougall what happened in Alberta with the schools when the pupils had not sufficient books to read. It was explained by the questioner that in Alberta schools were handicapped because of the necessary purchase of books. MacDougall replied that in Alberta they found where this system was introduced the necessary books followed as a matter of course, the parents and authorities realizing that they must have the textbooks if they were to make a success of the scheme.

This paper was followed by another on "The Enterprise Program in Practice," by two speakers, Dr. C. C. Goldring, Superintendent of Schools, Toronto, and Dr. C. E. Stothers, Public School Inspector, Prince Edward Island. Dr. Goldring explained first the meaning of Enterprises as individual or group activities undertaken by the children for a purpose that appeals to them. He pointed out that Enterprises have been carried on in Toronto for the past twenty years and have been used with increasing frequency during the last five years. He went on to give numerous examples of Enterprises in Ontario. He estimated that of 2,200 public school teachers of Toronto, 95% to 90% do Enterprises as a feature of school work.
