## CANADA AND THE OLD COUNTRY

Interesting Lectures at St. James and Zion

## SCENES IN SCOTLAND

Graphically Pictured by Judge McDonald.—Rev. R. G. Sinclair tells of the Northwest.

A good audience greeted the Rev. G. R. Sinclair, Montague, in Zion church Sunday School room last night. The lecturer held his audience in rapt attention for nearly two hours, as he took them with him in his travels through the great West during the Seventies. The different places along the route of travel were graphically pictured and the hardships of locomotion which travellers in that time experienced. The great natural wealth of the west was brought before the audience in a manner which will have a lasting impression on those who were privileged to attend. Brief remarks were made by Hon. D. Farquharson and Rev. R. W. Stevenson and a vote of thanks extended to the lecturer for his valuable services. His hearers hope to hear again from Mr. Sinclair in the near future.

There was a very large attendance at St. James' Hall last evening to hear Judge McDonald's lecture on the places he had visited while in England, at the Coronation.

Rev. T. F. Fullerton presided and happily introduced the Judge who in opening described the scenes in London at the announcement of the illness of the King. When the coronation had been postponed the visitors in London left for different parts; he went to the North Country.

The description of Northern England and Scotland through which he traversed by way of the locks was graphic and well repaid the very large audience for their attendance. An interesting feature of his visit to the Old Country was his stay at the Queen Hotel, Oban where the wrecked Charlottetown merchants boarded after their ship had stranded on Skerryvore. The proprietress, a Mrs. Angus still had vivid recollections of the jovial Charlottetownians. The lecture was illustrated by stereopticon views. The lantern was operated by A. E. Morrison. The Judge announced that the lecture would be continued at another evening to which those present as well as many others will look forward with pleasure.

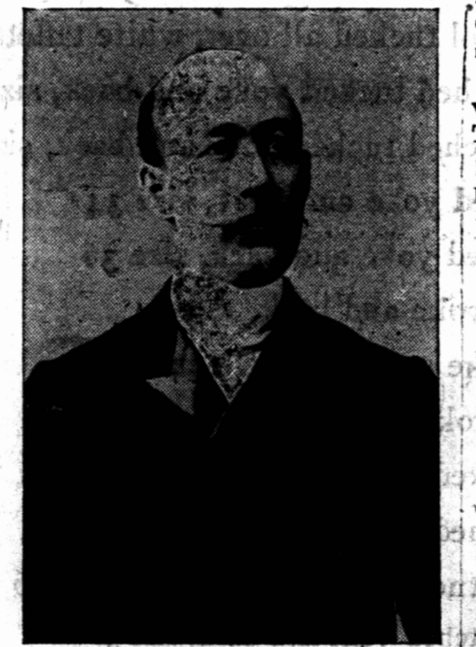

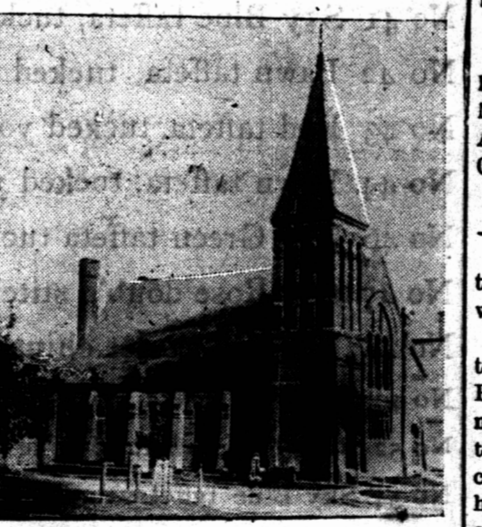


REV. J. L. MINER, PASTOR.

## ABEGWEITS WIN BOTH CONTESTS

In Hockey at Hillsboro Rink Last Night

## BOTH GAMES WERE CLOSE

But the Wearers of the Red and Black Proved their Superiority on the Ice.

The Abegweits won the Senior and Intermediate Hockey Games from Summerside in the second matches of the League series at Hillsboro Rink last night. The score in the former was 3 to 1; in the latter 7 to 5. Both games were good exhibitions of the winter sport and decidedly interesting from the spectators' standpoint: up to the last there was no "sure thing" for either team. The Intermediate game ranked with senior in clever work and was perhaps the best Intermediate contest ever played in the rink. Both teams have promising material. The Senior game was a surprise, as it was believed by many knowing ones that the Abegweits were doomed. But they have improved wonderfully since their last game; they showed better endurance; their defence worked better and their forwards were faster. There is yet room for improvement. Their forwards must learn to shoot more accurately. The Summerside team has an excellent defence, their goal keeper particularly doing phenomenal work which saved their chivald on several occasions. Their forwards are fast; they have good combination, but apparently they did not know where to use it to the best advantage. "Loosin'" too which the referee failed to penalize was not to be commended. These tactics were especially noticeable on the wings.

The managers fulfilled their promise that the game would start on time for which they received the encomiums of the large crowd that filled the rink. It was 8:07 when Referee Brehaut called the teams together. The half was evenly contested. Macmillan lifted a goal from cover, and at half time the score was 1 to nil in the Abegweits' favor. The second half resulted in a goal for Summerside from a lift by Gaudet, and when time was called the score was 1 to 1. The teams decided to play off and during the 10 minutes Macmillan lifted a second goal; and Davy and Williams by a pretty piece of combination play added a third for the Abegweits. The game ended Abbies 3, Summerside 1. The first half of the Intermediate game ended Abbies 6, Summerside 1. In the second half the latter did better work and tallied four to their opponents ones. Total Abbies 7, Summerside 5.
