head of the river above the old site of Alley's Mill. Reports of rainbows being taken in numbers from Scales Pond in addition to the Cardigan river caused this columnist to make inquiries from the Department concerning as to the legal status of rainbows taken during the regular trout season outside the restricted lakes area.

The answer was that rainbow trout taken out of bounds were legal trophies providing they were taken in legal trout season. In case some fishermen are wondering how Scales Pond came to harbour rainbow trout in such quantities I offer the following information. Five or six years ago fishery officers in the Province found that they had a surplus of approximately ten thousand rainbow fry on hand after stocking the three aforementioned lakes to their estimated capacity.

A communication was forwarded to Ottawa regarding their disposal. Word was received from Departmental heads that if there was a dam in the province that was large and well constructed with a good depth of water and a known scarcity of speckled trout it would be in order to plant the excess rainbow fry in such a pond. The fry were accordingly released in Scales Pond with no strings attached. Meaning that they come under the jurisdiction of Section 18 (1) which provides that one may fish for, catch or kill any speckled trout, or any kind of trout, from April 16th to September 15th, both days inclusive.

I trust that this explanation will put trout fishermen, the majority of them at least, on the right track in respect to rainbow trout. I know that I for one will be very glad, as the song writer so aptly put it: "When we come to the Rainbow's End..."

**STALLION ENROLMENT**

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this Province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry on inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

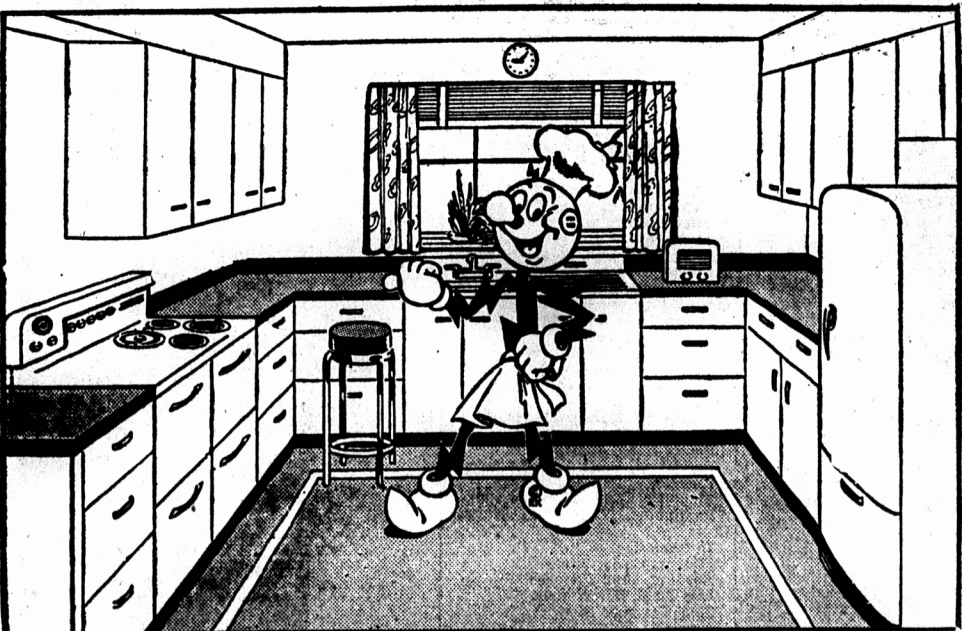
