(Continued from page 1) however, the usual number of appeals in the docket. The number of persons in jail since the last session and listed the various crimes they had been charged with. Liquor control in the last few years has been a problem in this province and had to be dealt with by a number of Premiers, he said. The problem would always exist and he hesitated to suggest a remedy. Those in charge of administering the law had done their best but as long as there is a demand for an article it would be sold.

There are those who say if good liquor were obtainable there would be less bootleg liquor sold. However, he was not in a position to say whether or not this was so. He commended the City and R.C.M.P. for their work in this connection. Turning to the war situation, he remarks that things had taken a turn for the better and now the Allies are on the offensive. The struggle is assuming a better aspect at present. It is the general opinion that the war will be over before 1944 - let us all hope this will be true.

Grand Jury's Report May I Please Your Lordship: We the members of the Grand Jury do hereby submit the following report: In your remarks this morning you made reference to the incarceration of Chief Justice MacNeilson. We the members of the Grand Jury do extend the very sincere wish for his speedy recovery, and early return to duties.

We heartily concur in the remarks made by your Lordship with regard to world conditions, and join with you in the very earnest wish and prayer that order and peace may be restored in the very near future. In the discharge of our duties we visited Queen's County Gaol, Falconwood Hospital and the Provincial Infirmary and are pleased to report that we found these institutions to be clean, sanitary, and efficiently managed.

At Falconwood we found two hundred and seventy-three male prisoners, and 142 females. We inspected the institution throughout and found it in first class condition. This institution is under the capable supervision of Doctor Murchison, and the management of Doctor McLaughlin and Mrs. Dignan and staff.

At the Provincial Infirmary we found the institution to be in good condition and capably managed by Mrs. Garrick, who we find is greatly handicapped by overcrowded conditions. Reason for overcrowding is the large number of patients in this institution are clean and well cared for. Great credit is due Mrs. Garrick and staff for the welfare and care of the patients.

With further regard to our visit at Falconwood we would respectfully submit the following recommendations: (1) That a window be converted into a fire-escape in the east female basement dormitory. (2) That an exit be installed in the building in case of conflagration. (3) We recommend that all meals consumed in the above institutions should undergo Government inspection.

S' Side Board Of Trade Meets

A regular meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last night in the town hall. The President A. R. Brennan presiding. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. A communication was read from Mr. McClure, Secretary of the Maritime Board of Trade, requesting figures on the increase of the population of Summerside. Reason for requesting this information was that the Maritime Board felt that the Maritime Board should have a larger percentage of supplies for civilian use than they are getting at present. The matter was left in the hands of the committee for town improvement and the secretary to estimate the increase.

A communication from Col. the Hon. J. R. Ralston, announcing that the Summerside post office was now in the category of staff post office was read. The president gave a most interesting review of the conditions under which the staff of the post office worked during the past year. The highest number of pieces of mail received was 13,000. This year it reached as high as 24,000. The peak figure was 45,000 letters and 3,000 parcels. In two days the staff handled over a thousand pieces of mail. It was moved by John E. Rogers that a vote of thanks be tendered to the staff of the post office for their successful efforts in having the Summerside post office placed in the category of staff post office.

Campbell that the rails be erected. The matter of the annual meeting was discussed and the president reported that the local committee could not accommodate the Board for their annual banquet. In reporting for the marine committee Mr. J. E. Campbell announced that the coats for the men on the corvette "Summerside" had been purchased, paid for in full and shipped to Halifax two weeks ago and moved by C. R. Rogers and seconded by Mr. J. E. Dalton that the Board express their appreciation for the efforts in this matter.

WILL ATTEND MEETINGS AT OTTAWA - Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan leaves for Ottawa on Jan. 14 to attend a meeting of the Council of the Canadian Medical Association there on the 15th and 17th. The Council is composed of 140 members and the Executive of thirty, and both bodies after sitting separately on Tuesday and Wednesday, will meet jointly on Thursday to discuss proposals for a national health insurance scheme to be presented at the forthcoming session of the Dominion Parliament. From Ottawa Dr. MacMillan will proceed to Toronto to attend a meeting of the Canadian Red Cross Society which meets on the 19th and 20th.

ICE DAMAGES CABLE - Drift ice in Northumberland Strait yesterday crushed the submarine cable between this province and Nova Scotia, rendering it unusable. The cable is used by the Island Telephone Company. Repairs will not be made until after the leaves the Strait next spring. Similar damage was caused last winter. Rocky ledges in shallow water where the cable goes ashore both at Woodville and Carleton Place, the trouble, it was said. As soon as the car was opened the boy entered before he could handle a case of goods. He collapsed. Not knowing just what happened the lad, the teacher, called two railway employees, J. Dickie and Harry Spencer, who seeing at once what happened quickly entered the fume-filled car and brought the boy out. They kept him on his feet and walked him about in the fresh air until he fully regained consciousness.

War Service Committee Of C.W.L. Meets

The War Service Committee of the Catholic Women's League met in the Upper Room of the Holy Name Hall yesterday afternoon. The War Service Convener reported nine divisions organized and referred to the Councilors as future builders. Since the formation of the committee results have been most gratifying. Mrs. J. H. Blanchard reported that 629 Holy Masses have been offered for the souls of the men of the armed forces who have made the "supreme sacrifice." Spiritual Bouquet, comprising Holy Communion, 629 and prayers offered 16,512. Religious articles distributed, 77. 16 men of the armed forces entertained at "Communion Breakfasts."

On account of her work the Red Cross Councilor was unable to be present so report of 2nd Division is not complete. 191 quilts and 32 afghanes were reported packed and labeled at the Red Cross. Mrs. P. Casey told of 26 dirty bags made; 12 pairs socks; one sleeveless sweater; 4 pairs seaman's stockings; 2 pairs of boy's socks; 16 children's dresses; 10 children's sweaters; 2 girls cloth coats; one knitted boy's suit; 2 helmets; 3 tucks in; and 4 boy's suits cut. Mrs. P. Walker says \$143.25 worth of War Saving Stamps were sold around Christmas and \$24.50 worth sold previous by girls making a total of \$167.75. Mrs. J. E. Curline in charge of Mechant Marine Division sent ditto bags complete to the Seaman's Club - value \$75. Mrs. P. J. Ready distributed 3,100 cigarettes and 16 packages of cigarettes.

Mrs. R. J. McDonald reported acknowledgment of the receipt of 37 parcels sent by the request of Rev. Father Reggie McDonald for B.I.L.I. children. Mrs. S. Trainor gives list of donations as follows: Apostleship of the Sea, \$10; Red Cross Drive, \$10; Kingston, \$2.50; Milk for British, \$10; Blanket Fund, \$10; Children's Fund, \$5; British Children's Fund, \$18; Donation for writing material, \$11; Georgetown donation to Red Cross, \$8. Mr. Polard distributed 60 papers and magazines to armed forces. Mrs. F. E. Christopher has consented to take charge of division for entertainment of armed forces. 40 dozen doughnuts were given. Of particular interest was the entertainment given around Christmas and New Year. The efforts of Chaplain Rev. Louis Dugan ministered to help in all this untiring endeavor. It is possible to furnish the following reports: 113 men of the armed forces were entertained and 13 of these men were guests for 5 days and several for 2 days.
