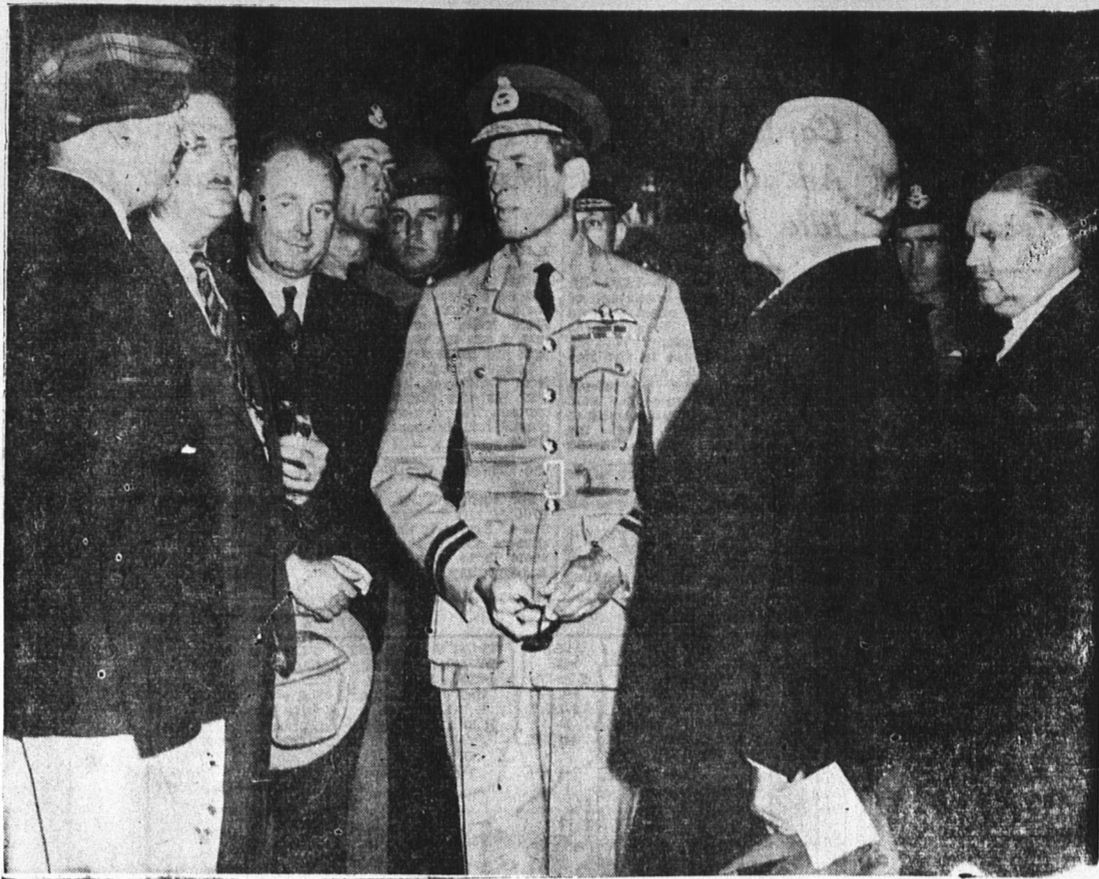

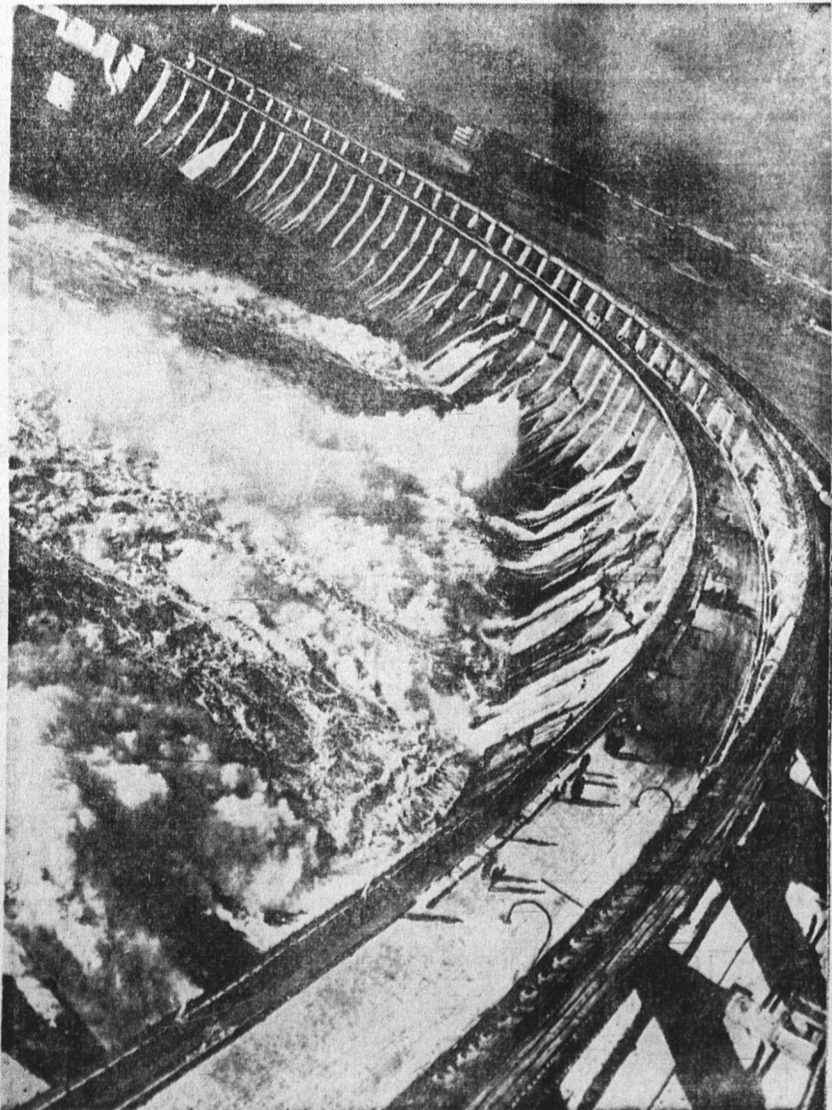

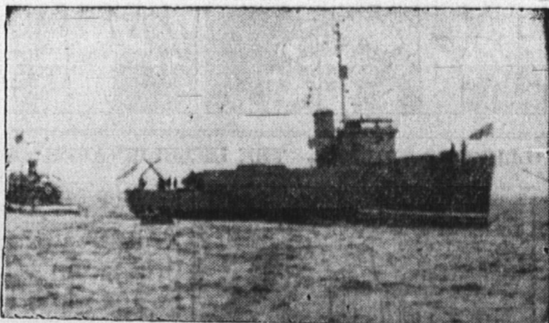
These mountain men of Iran may be first to see invading armies. Typical of that group of natives still clinging to ancient dress and custom, they live in the north, near the Russian frontier.



This gigantic crescent is the Dnieper dam—near Zaporozhe, in the Ukraine, an up-to-date buttress against the flooding Dnieper river. But at the moment; apparently, Soviet military authorities feel the torrent of the unleashed river is needed as a buttress against the pressing Nazis, and a report from Stockholm, printed in London, says the dam has been blown up, leaving 275 miles of the river a raging flood. "The engineers, who had operated the barrage for 10 years wrecked the machinery which was their pride," the report said. Thousands of German soldiers are said to have been engulfed.



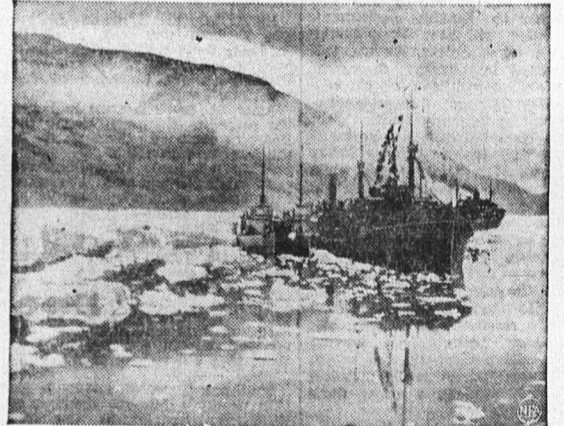
SHEILA MACDONALD PERFORMS NAVAL CEREMONY



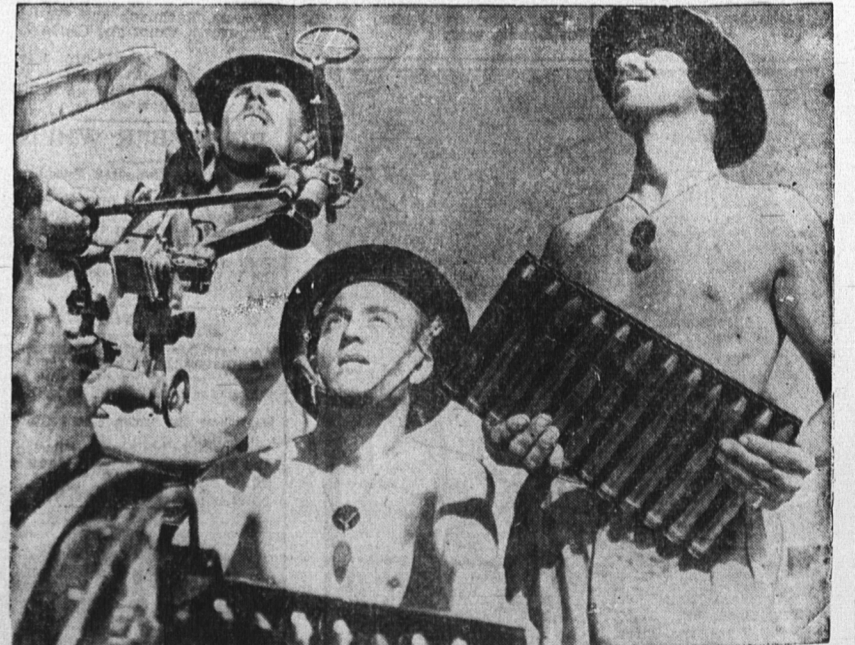
