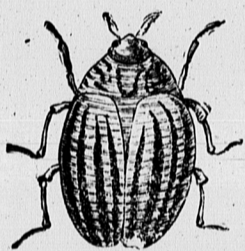

### MARGARET ILLINGTON'S MATRIMONIAL TRIALS.

NEW YORK, June 23—After a rather brief engagement in a role of domesticity, Margaret Illington, the actress, who was Mrs. Daniel Frohman and is now Mrs. Edward J. Bowes, is to return to a professional life unless plans now under way go awry. Miss Illington, it is announced, is now in New York, and her future manager, Edward Ellsner, is stopping at a hotel near Times Square.

The plans for her coming season include her appearance as a star in a play adapted from the French. She expects to open in Denver, Col., some time in August and to play an extended tour.

Miss Illington retired from the stage in December, 1908, when starring in The Thief with Kyrie Ellsler. She was said to be suffering from nervous breakdown, and went to California to recuperate. About two months later Daniel Frohman, her husband and manager, made an announcement that she was to seek a divorce. Differences in tastes was given as the reason.

In California Miss Illington was interviewed, and announced that she had left Mr. Frohman because she had not been happy on the stage.

"The life of an actress is abnormal," she said in the interview. "I crave domesticity, home life, children; I want to darn socks. My life has been on railroads, in trunks, cabs and hotels. When I found that Mr. Frohman intended to keep me on the stage always my love died. I saw that no chance of the domestic life I craved. So we parted."

Then Mrs. Frohman went to Reno, Nev., where she took up residence. She returned to California for her husband's sake, but kept the Reno residence for divorce purposes, and on Nov. 10 obtained a decree on the ground of non-support. Nov. 14 she was married to Edward Bowes, a real estate operator of San Francisco and Tacoma. Mr. Bowes was a personal friend of Mr. Frohman, and, had been cheerfully accepted by the theatrical manager.

### CARRIED THROUGH FACTORY SLUICE.

ST. JOHN, June 22—A young man who last summer distinguished himself by escaping from the Brussels Street lockup, bending aside the bars in a grating above the door, yesterday afternoon added to his fame. He jumped into the Marsh Creek, urged, it is said, by a revolver in the hands of his sister-in-law, and was carried through the sluice gates at the Marsh bridge. His escapade was witnessed by the workmen employed there by Contractor Clark. The man's name was admired by the witnesses of the affair, and his luck was envied.

The start of the thing was near the sluice factory, about two hundred yards up the Marsh Creek. The man and his sister-in-law engaged in some kind of a row in the woman's home near the factory, and she chased him from the house at the point of the gun. He evidently took the turn of the sluice, and was running strongly down at the time, and after he swam some distance he was caught by the current and carried along. He could not control himself and was carried head first through the sluice. The watchers hardly expected to see him come through alive, although the thing had been done before. He did reappear, however, and he came up smiling.

### COUSINS HANGED AT LANCASTER, PA.

LANCASTER, Pa., June 22—Waiter and Benjamin Aston, cousins, were hanged today for the murder of Alfred Hallman in Pequia Township in January, 1909. Hallman and his aged wife lived in a hovel and were known to have money.

The two Astons and Paul Fornwalt went to the Hallman's home intending to rob it. While Benjamin Aston stood guard outside the other two entered the house. Benjamin and Fornwalt entered the place and finding neighbors in the house opened fire, killing Hallman. The neighbors fled, one of them receiving a slight wound from a revolver. Mrs. Hallman, who was ill, witnessed the tragedy from her bed. The three men fled without getting any money, and subsequently were arrested and made confessions. They accused a saloon-keeper of planning the robbery, but he was acquitted. Fornwalt, who is only 19 years old, claimed he was induced to become a member of the party while intoxicated. He was convicted of murder in the second degree.

### CALVIN AUSTIN MADE FAST RUN ON FROM BOSTON.

ST. JOHN, June 22—The Eastern Steamship Company's steamer Calvin Austin, in command of Captain Pike, arrived yesterday morning and docked at 6.15 o'clock, inaugurating the new summer schedule of six trips a week.

The steamer made the voyage from Boston in nineteen hours, coming direct with 177 passengers. The steamer made connections with the trains and boats for all these points and thus obviated a stop over in St. John for those who were in a hurry to get to their destination. Passengers for the North Shore were able to catch the I. C. R. express leaving at 7.10 a.m. The steamer left at 7 o'clock last evening on her return voyage. The indications point to a big tourist season via this route.

### RECORD BROADSIDE HAS BEEN FIRED.

LONDON, June 22—In the official trials of the Brazilian battleship Sao Paulo, carried out by the Brazilian Commission which came to England to take over the vessel from the English constructors, the record broadside has been fired. Ten 12-inch guns and eleven 11-inch guns were discharged simultaneously.

The weight of metal fired in this salvo was just over 9,000 pounds, or four and one-half tons. The force developed would have been sufficient to lift the Sao Paulo thirty-five feet into the air. Severe though the shock was, the ship was in no way damaged.

It is asserted that no other battleship yet completed, except the sister of the Sao Paulo, the Minas Geraes, can fire such broadside. In the latest British Dreadnoughts now in service the broadside is delivered by eight, instead of ten 12-inch guns and thirteen 4-inch weapons. The number of weapons is the same, but the weight of metal is very much less.

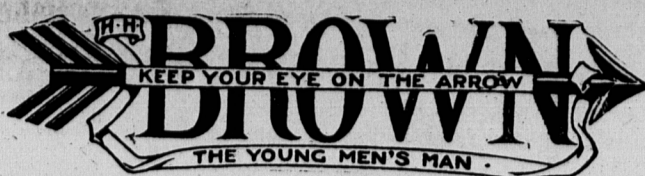
