Soiling Crops For Dairy Cattle

(Experimental Farms Note). Soiling crops will help maintain the milk flow of the dairy herd every year. It is usually necessary to feed a soiling crop as soon as the sweet succulent pastures of June and July are passed or the dairy cows will drop off in milk production.

Green feed should be supplied fresh and regularly just as soon as required, for it is much harder to get a cow back to her flow than it is to enable her to maintain a high yield, by the use of soiling crops. Silage is the only competitor of green feed, when cows are out to pasture. To feed the cows have to be stabled every day. Fresh corn, sunflowers or mixed grain are much better relished when fed in the open.

Corn is usually the best soiling crop. Some years it is too late maturing to be available when it is first required. Sunflowers have been used successfully by a number of dairymen as a soiling crop. The greatest difficulty experienced was in getting the cows started. To get them to start it is necessary to keep other green feed such as corn and mixed grain away from them. Feed only a small quantity at first. They will probably only eat a few of the leaves the first time or so. Once they get a taste of the center of the stalk they will clean every bit up. At least that has been the experience of many men who state that their cows not only maintained their flow on sunflowers as a soiling crop but made good increases in their yields of milk.

Oats peas and vetches when sown at intervals of about ten days will supply a satisfactory soiling crop throughout the season. This mixture though producing a smaller yield per acre, is a surer crop and is high in dry matter when compared with either corn or sunflowers. It will require about half as much more land to furnish the soiling crop for your cows when mixed grain is used. Should the pastures turn out better than was expected, the balance of the early sown mixed grain may be allowed to ripen for grain and the later sown can be out in the milk to make excellent hay.

Death in B. C. of Mr. L. J. Miller

It is our painful duty today to chronicle the death of Mr. Lemuel James Miller, B. A., M. A., L. B., which occurred at his home in Penitence, B. C. Thursday. He was the third son of the late Mr. Lemuel Miller, for many years Principal of West Kent School, Charlottetown, and was widely known and much esteemed in his native city, and also in this province. He was the winner of the Governor General's Medal in West Kent, and his subsequent career in the Prince of Wales College, Dalhousie University was an unusually promising. At the Prince of Wales College he was the winner of the Vice Chancellor's Medal for English.

After graduating with high honors at this institution, he entered Dalhousie University at Halifax. There his career was also both brilliant and notable. He graduated with great distinction in English Literature and was awarded the highest prize in his class. Mr. Miller then proceeded to his Master's Degree, and the degree of M. A. was conferred upon him in due course. It was his intention to continue his studies, looking forward to a professional and literary career. He had a literary sense of a very high order, and a literary appreciation which was very marked. His contributions to several periodicals and magazines were of such unusual distinction, that if his falling health and diminishing strength had not interfered with his work, his career in letters would have been quite distinguished.

For three years Mr. Miller was Professor of English in Prince of Wales College. He then entered upon the study of law and took his L. B. degree at Dalhousie. Unfortunately however, his shattered health forced him to seek another climate, and in 1917, by orders of his physician he left for Western Canada, locating in Penitence, British Columbia. The change was of some slight benefit and Professor Miller resumed teaching, becoming Principal of the High School of Penitence. In this position he continued until forced to retire, after which he entered the Sanatorium at Tranquille, B. C., where he remained until the end.

As a student, the late Mr. Miller showed great promise, which was later fulfilled in his achievements. As a teacher, his work was characterized by marked success. He was a young man of very high ideals, whose loss to a rising generation of students is deeply regrettable. There are left to cherish his memory and mourn their loss, a wife, (daughter of the late Dr. Goodwill of Halifax) and three children, also an aged mother, two brothers, Mr. J. A. Miller at home, and Dr. A. F. Miller of the Sanatorium at Kentville, N. S. also three sisters, Mrs. (Dr) N. E. MacKay, Halifax; Mrs. N. B. Morine, Wolfville and Mrs. F. J. Nash, Charlottetown.

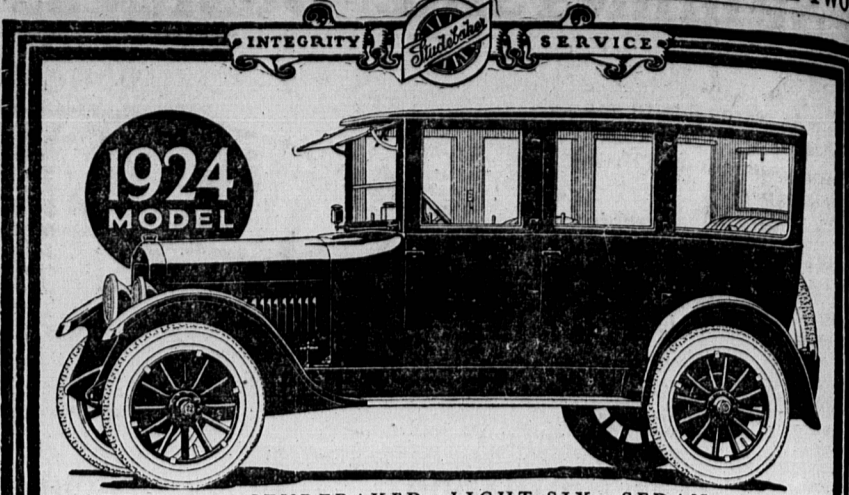

MOTHER MAY BREAK SON'S ENGAGEMENT WASHINGTON, Pa., Aug. 31.—The Washington Court has decided that any woman in Pennsylvania has a perfect right to exert sufficient influence over her son to have him break off an engagement to marry, if she is displeased with her prospective daughter-in-law. This decision was made in an opinion handed down by Judge Erwin Cummins, in dismissing the suit of Gertrude Lowenstein against Mrs. Florence McGowan for damages.
