Laurier Tells of New Measures

Yet to Be Presented to Parliament Before Prorogation Can Take Place.

OTTAWA, July 7-(Special)-In the House of Commons this morning Sir W. Laurier announced that the Government measures still to be brought down are the supplementary estimates, railway, subsidies, a measure respecting Quebec Bridge, some resolutions necessitated by the creation of new courts in Northern Ontario and a resolution respecting the extension of the northern boundary of Ontario, Manitoba and Quebec.

New Stamps for Tercentenary

OTTAWA, July 6.-In view of the coming celebration of the tercentenary anniversary of the foundation of Quebec, Hon. Mr. Lemieux, Postmaster-General, has given instructions to issue a commemorative series of postage stamps.

HALIFAX, July 6.-The new cruiser Inflexible, which is undergoing her official trials on the Clyde has attained a speed of nearly twenty-seven knots over the measured mile. This record was made by a reduction in the weight of the cruiser's armor.

These advices have been confirmed by a despatch received by the Minister of Foreign Affairs from the Argentine Legation at Asuncion, officially notifying the Minister that the Revolutionary party had succeeded in overthrowing the Paraguayan Government, and that several of the Paraguayan Ministers of State had taken refuge in the Legation.

Bank Officials Say Not Guilty

Mgr., of the defunct Bank St. Jean, were formally committed by Judge Lanctot to stand trial before the Court of Kings Bench on the double charge of making false returns to Government and of conspiring to defraud the creditors of the Bank.

New Car for the P.E.I. Railway

Supt. Sharp of the P. E. I. Railway, seeing the necessity of a better service to meet the requirements of the summer tourist trade, has had a beautiful car built which is the precursor to a parlor car service. Supt. Sharp was the first to suggest of what design it should be. The car was built under the supervision of Henry Coffin, master car builder. The fine work was done by Frederick Danerell, P. L. Aitken, John Henderson, Malcolm Gillis and Peter Ferguson. The car is that paragon of excellence which Charles Simmons decorator and painter can turn out. It is the same size as an ordinary car, but has larger windows, and hence gets the name of observation car. It has a room partitioned off in which are large comfortable rattan chairs. The passengers can draw the chairs out on the platforms, which are large and railed off, and enjoy the air and scenery, which P. E. I. Railway only can give. Twenty five cents extra is charged for the parlor portion of the car per seat.

Harvard and Cambridge Race
