HAMPTON NOTES.—The challenge trot between Bessie Rampart and Y. Lillian did not come off, owing to the bad ice.—Mr. J. G. McLeod has returned home from lumbering in Stanchel.—Mr. Hampson Bowman has been visiting friends in West Royalty.—Mr. Wm. H. Rodd has drawn a large quantity of musse mud from North River.

At 10.30 yesterday morning the Minto was reported in sight and large numbers sought points of advantage to watch her as she came up the harbor. At 11.15 she reached the pier. In conversation with one of the passengers he stated the boat did not stop from the time she left Picton until she came up to the pier at Charlottetown, making the crossing in four hours. Passengers report a pleasant passage with considerable ice in the straits. 1898 the Stanley attempted to reach this port on March 4th but failed, and discharged and loaded outside the harbor by teams. On March 21st, of the same year she made another attempt and reached port on the following day at 4 p. m. and continued running until April 11th. In 1899 the Stanley reached this port on April 17th and ran until April 23th when the Steam Navigation Company took up the service. In 1900 the Stanley arrived on April 6th and continued service until April 16th.

ALBERRY PLAINS NOTES.—The farmers in this part of the Garden of the Gulf are busily engaged in procuring their rails and firewood.—Mr. Howard Farquharson continues to wield the birchen rod to the best of his ability.—Miss Libbie McMillan and Miss Maggie Cairns have been visiting friends in Charlottetown during the past week.—The Alberry Plains Farmers' Club is in a flourishing condition, and has not lost any of its former vigor. The annual meeting was held some time ago, at which the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, J. F. Jenkins; Vice Pres., Patrick Cairns; Sec. Treas., James McEachern; Executive Committee, P. J. D. Edmunds, Thomas Richards, Charles McMillan, Joseph Pratt and William McMillan. We may undoubtedly predict that, with this excellent choice of officers, the club will progress during their regime.—On the evening of Thursday, 21st, the school house was comfortably filled with the inhabitants of Alberry Plains and vicinity, when an excellent lecture was given them by Private F. B. McRae's lecture on the South African war. The president of the club, Mr. Jenkins, presided, and in very fitting words introduced the speaker. Private McRae came forward in khaki and occupied the rapt attention of his audience for more than two hours. He first referred to the cause of the war and then with his maps carefully described the engagements which led up to the famous battle of Paardeberg. He spoke in glowing terms of the Canadians—not the least prominent being our Island boys, the death of Taylor and Biggs were also referred to, the lecturer telling how they happened to shed their blood on the African velt. After the lecture Private McRae showed the audience several reminiscences of the war—a collection of Boer cartridges, lamps, boots, badges, etc. which were very interesting. A unanimous vote of thanks to the lecturer, for the very interesting and able manner he entertained the meeting, was moved by Patrick Cairns seconded by P. J. D. Edmunds and tendered the lecturer by the chairman to which a suitable acknowledgment was made. The lecture was interspersed by some very appropriate musical selections by Messrs John and Thomas Richards. The eventful evening was brought to a close by singing God Save the King.
