THE MARKETS.—The local market yesterday was very slimly attended, road conditions making it almost impossible in some districts. In the morning, no hay, straw oats or potatoes were being offered. The prices for the different commodities were: Vegetables (scarce) beets, carrots and parsnips, 15 to 20c per dozen; cabbage, 4c lb. Produce—Hay, per cwt, 85c to 90c; Oats, per bus, 85c; turnips 45c, bus; potatoes 60c to 70c, whites and blues; Beef (carcass), 12c; (cut) 14c to 25c; Pork—(carcass) 9 1/2c; (cut), 25c. No lamb or mutton being offered. Hides, 16c; Sheep skins, \$1.00; Calf skins, 12c lb. Fowl, 20c lb. No chickens offered. Butter 45c; eggs, 40c doz.
