Dominion Rubber Co. Reorganised



Above is W. A. Eden, president of the Dominion Rubber Company, who has announced a new operating system for his Company affecting 7,000 employees in Canada. Four new general managers of separate departments have been appointed.

MONTREAL, July 13.—A completely new operating system for the Dominion Rubber Company, to meet steadily expanding business, was announced here today by W. A. Eden, president of the company.

By the new system the Dominion Rubber Company is now divided into separate departments of tires, footwear and mechanical goods, each with a general manager who is responsible for both, production and sales of his commodity. A fourth general manager is responsible for all warehousing and shipping.

This becomes effective at once and is to be followed by a plan for participation in profits by those whose work deserves reward.

In making his announcement Mr. Eden explained that the remarkable growth of the Dominion Rubber Company and continuance of expansion as Canada progresses have made the old centralized type of organization inadequate.

"In 1910," Mr. Eden said, "our total business was about six million dollars. Last year our sales including subsidiaries were nearly twenty-four million and our staff has grown to over 7,000 employees across Canada. Our main departments of tires, footwear and mechanical goods have become virtually three great industries within one company and they now require separate administration to give maximum service.

"This has been accomplished by appointing a general manager of tires, a general manager of footwear, a general manager of mechanical goods and a general manager of warehouses and shipping. In other words our production and sales are now decentralized according to commodities. With this, we have re-arranged the Canadian market in three divisions, Eastern, Central and Western."

Taking the new tire department as an example, Mr. Eden explained that the general manager of tires is completely responsible for everything to do with tires and is not directly responsible for anything else. He has under him a tire factory manager and a general tire sales manager. The tire sales manager in turn has his own divisional sales managers, Eastern, Central and Western. The other departments are organized in the same way.

Mr. Eden added that the Dominion Rubber Company's adoption of this type of organization is an expression of confidence and faith in the future growth of Canadian industry in which his company will continue

Beekeeper's Notes

METHODS OF SWARM CONTROL

S. A. Hilton, Dominion Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S.

Swarming is the cause of a heavy loss each year in the honey crop, due to the fact that while preparations for swarming are going on the field bees are inactive. If this takes place during the main honey flow, the latter part of June and early in July, it means that the bulk of the clover flow is lost. It is a sound practice to employ some method of swarm control as a means of reducing this loss to a minimum. The presence of queen cells in a hive which has a queen means either preparation for swarming or superseding of the old queen.

A method for detection of preparation for swarming has been tried out at the Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S. This is done by the use of a shallow super as part of the brood chamber. By tipping this from the rear, queen cells will be observed along the lower edges of the combs if the bees are making swarming preparations and the hive may then be treated.

Two methods of treatment for swarming have been tried out; one, "Dequeening and Requeening," and the other, "Separation of the queen and brood." The former has proven somewhat better over a period of years and the procedure is as follows:—As soon as the queen cells containing larvae are observed, destroy these and remove the queen either by killing or by starting a nucleus if increase is desired and the old queen is a prolific one. Then nine days later, again destroy all queen cells and introduce a young laying queen, or if one is not available, leave one queen cell, or give a cell from one of the best colonies in the apiary. The former method, is better, however. The bees will continue working and storing honey during this time, where otherwise they would stay in the hive until a virgin emerged and they swarmed.

The other method consists of destroying the queen cells and placing the brood above the queen excluder at giving the queen a new brood chamber with empty drawn combs.

In the spring, it is a wise policy to clip the wings of all queens that are laying, thus preventing loss of the swarm should swarming occur. Colonies should be examined every nine or ten days and the use of shallow super enables a rapid examination as it is not necessary to examine any brood chambers except those having queen cells on the lower edge of the shallow combs.


