## Leafs And Amerks Score 4-1 Victories Over Maroons, Hawks As Canucks Down Rangers 2-1

TORONTO, Nov. 29—A week's (C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) rest from the national hockey League wars was faced Toronto Maple Leafs today as the Canadian section warriors surveyed the pack after an easy 4-0 victory over the section's cellar dwellers, Montreal Maroons.

Clancy came "home" with his Maroons Saturday night for the first time this season—and 12,000 fans were disappointed by the Montrealers showing Leafs seldom were in danger after Red Horner, the bad man turned good, paced a first period goal.

The Leafs attack was paced again by the league's leading scorer, Gordon Drillon. The husky right-winger fired two goals, one in each of the second and third periods, and it was Horner, rapidly becoming one of the Toronto paymasters, who assisted on one.

Wiseman notched his second tally of the game in the third period with the aid of Nels Stewart and Tommy Anderson, and Schriener scored following a sparkling individual rush which trapped the Chicagoans in the New York end of the rink.

## Queen's Wins College Title In Overtime

(By SYDNEY GRUSON Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, Nov. 28—(OP)—His-roy was made a new champion on the throne today as the fighting footballers of Queen's University ruled the Intercollegiate Union again. For drama and thrills the 1937 college final will live a long time in the memories of 8,000 spectators.

In the gathering gloom of an autumn afternoon, Ted Reeve's tricolor outgrowth university of Toronto for a 7-6 victory Saturday. The teams played through 20 minutes overtime before deciding this sudden death struggle for the college championship.

Victory dangled in front of Toronto until the second last play of overtime. With the crowd excited to church-like quietness in huge Varsity stadium, this was the situation.

Toronto had marched 65 yards on two forward passes and the tricolor 15. They lined up there and Barry Gray held the ball for Cam Gray about 8 yards further back as Cam got set for a placement field goal that would have won the game for Toronto 8-7.

Ranked without a peer at his specialty, Cam booted quickly just before a charging tricolor wing line lifted him off his feet. The ball went low for a single and with it went Toronto's championship.

Queen's had climaxed a grand comeback to the title with five straight victories after dropping their opening two games of the season.

Never before in the history of the college union had a championship been decided in overtime.

## Fordham And Pitt Still Unbeaten

NEW YORK, Nov. 28—(OP)—The football powerhouses of the United States East, Pitt and Fordham, offered a little rebuttal today to offset Alabama's claim to a berth in the Rose Bowl against California at Pasadena New Year's Day.

The virtual end of the campaign Saturday saw most of the glamor and tradition concentrated at Philadelphia where Army subdued Navy 6-0 in the annual service battle but it remained for Pitt and Fordham to keep the Rose Bowl question alive.

Pitt, unbeaten and tied only by Fordham, took advantage of two fumbles to whip Duke's blue devils 10-0 before a crowd of 40,000 at Durham while 65,000 saw Fordham, likewise unbeaten, spill New York University after more of a dog fight than most experts had expected, 20-7.

DETROIT, Nov. 28—The champion Detroit Red Wings, still in the throes of a slump, absorbed a 3-1 lacing tonight from the Montreal Maroons. The win gave Maroons a split on their weekend play for they lost 4-0 last night to Toronto Maple Leafs.

Maroons by the victory pulled into a third place tie with Montreal Canadiens in the National Hockey League's Canadian Section.

Red Wings could have got out of the United States division cellar by winning tonight, but they could not crack the Maroon defence.

The defeat before 8,819 spectators, was the Detroiters' sixth in nine games.

Russ Blinco scored his first goal of the year to put the Montrealers ahead at 11:19 of the opening period.

Baldy Northcott and Earl Robinson added Montreal's other pair midway in the second period.

BOSTON, Nov. 28—Old Nels Stewart turned the hat-trick for New York Americans tonight, and his three goals gave the Amerks a

Before a crowd of 12,000 the veteran centre whipped in all the Americans' goals in less than seven minutes during the second period. He wiped out the Bruins' 2-0 and 3-2 lead.

Mit Schmidt opened the Boston scoring during the last minute of the first period and Leroy Goldworthy and Charley Sands accounted for the Bruins' other scores, made during the second frame.

During the third session, while the Bruins were attacking in full force against the shorthanded Amerks, goalie Earl Robertson was cut over the eye and the action was halted until the wound was stitched.

The Bruins, starting without the injured Ray Getliffe, played the last 20 minutes without Red Beattie, who suffered a skate cut on his leg halfway through the third frame.

It was the Bruins' eighth game without a setback and by splitting the points, they piled up 14 out of a possible 16.

## Argos Defeat Roughriders For Title

TORONTO, Nov. 28—(OP)—Over the crimson mound concealing Ottawa's dead football hopes, Toronto Argonauts looked today towards the Canadian championship for the first time since 1923.

Past and young, equipped with overhead protection that made the road smoother, Argos won the Big Four title Saturday by defeating—but never conquering—Ottawa's roughriders 10-1. The defending champions, Roughriders had won the first game of the total-point playoff 15-11. The round score for Argos was 21-16.

Bob Ibsister, 22-year-old sculler halfback, punted and passed the victory strokes.

Smashing tackling on both sides stopped every other attacker, even Ottawa's crunching Dave Sprague, wildcat of a furious last-period drive, could only get so far. But there was no stopping Ibsister and the 20 yard punts he unleashed in defence of Toronto's lead.

When it was over, Argos had qualified to face Sarnia's Ontario title next Saturday. The winner of this series will play the west's blue bombers from Winnipeg in the national final Dec. 11.

Leading all the way and holding off a determined challenge from Marcus Marsh's Velvet Cushion, the 25-to-1 Solitaire won by half a length, covering the 1 1/2 miles in 2:42 1/5. Another three-quarters of a length back, in third place in the field of 31, was Lord Glanely's Marcus Superbus, who started joint favorite at 5 to 1 with Sir William Bass' Rasibus.

The race marked not only the end of a season but the final day of the great riding career of Steve Donoghue, who at the age of 53 is to become a trainer. Donoghue, the winning jockey in six derbies, rode Astyanax, who finished seventh.
