PRINCE EDWARD.—The excellent program of motion pictures presented at the Prince Edward last night drew splendid houses. Six pictures were shown, the feature was "Captain Jenny, S. A.," a three part motion drama which tells a story of a Salvation Army lassie who sacrifices her love to go to China in order that her sister may wed the man of her choice. This picture has to be seen to be appreciated. The other pictures on the program were "The Blue or the Grey," a strong dramatic story of the American civil war, "Bunny's Scheme," Vitagraph comedy featuring that popular comedian, "John Bunny," and "Billy's Riot," a sterling comedy enacted almost entirely by children and featuring the youngest and smallest comedian in motion pictures, Little Billy. **DAY OF SPECIAL PRAYER**

LONDON, August 18.—The Bishop of London has proclaimed Friday August 21st, as a special day of prayer and intercession for victory, but with perfect charity to all men.

Mr. Callbeck, Central Bedeque, The vacancies in districts 1, 2, 3 and 5 of Prince County the Executive Committee was given power to fill.

Mr. McCallum, of Southport, then addressed the meeting on the question of establishing a farmers' independent paper. He said that the farmers needed a paper of their own to represent their case as it ought to be represented. He moved that it be left to the Executive to deal with the proposal to establish a paper of their own that would "publish true statements about autos and all other matters in the interests of the farmers, and we agree to support that paper."

The resolution was seconded by Mr. Angus McPhee and a discussion followed on it. It was stated that the papers had ignored them on the question.

Mr. McKenzie, of Bradalbane, said he had no fault to find with the party that ran the automobile law in motion, and he would vote for them again as he had done before. He was a strong Conservative and had no intention of changing his policy; but he was against the automobiles and would do all in his power to banish them. The Conservative Party had done a great many things for the farmers and there was no question about that. The automobile question was not a party one, and they should all go about it in unison.

Mr. Jas. Godfrey, of Suffolk, said that party or no party they did not want automobiles.

Mr. J. H. Buntin by request addressed the meeting and protested against extravagant statements such as had been made by certain of the speakers regarding the press.

**MEETING OF ANTI AUTOISTS**

(Continued from page 1.)

speed was unjustifiable.

Mr. C. E. McKenzie, of Milton, expressed himself as being opposed to the automobiles, but if the majority of the people wanted them in Charlottetown he had no objection.

Mr. Frank Hughes was not in favour of the cars, but he thought that the automobilists, on the whole, had been rather extravagantly censured. He knew that many of them were respectable men who ran their cars within a reasonable limit of speed; there were some, of course, who did not respect the objections of the farmers and ran their cars wildly.

Mr. Wm. Gibson, of Marshfield, advocated the repeal of the automobile law.

Mr. Walter Scott, of New Brunswick (at present staying at Rocky Point) said he was a staunch Conservative and he would strongly advise them to sink party differences in the matter and deal with the automobile question purely one of automobiles and automobiles alone. He thought that every car should carry a speedometer and the penalties should be strictly exacted. Three health resorts in New Hampshire had excluded the automobiles and they were also forbidden in Bermuda. Thousands in the United States were tired of the din and noise of the motor cars and they would come to seek quiet rest if the automobiles were banished. He urged on the members to sink party differences and grapple with the question as one of automobiles.

A committee was then appointed to draw up by-laws for the Association.

The meeting then adjourned to 1 o'clock. After dinner the drafted by-laws were presented and discussed.

Mr. Frizzle, of Central Bedeque, said that the farmers to deal with the question as it ought to be dealt with, had to put their shoulders to the wheel and act in unison. He did not think the automobiles ought to be allowed to run in Charlottetown, for if they ran there they would simply encroach on the country.

Mr. Brodie was of the opinion that the question should be regarded from both its standpoints. He wanted to stop the automobiles from running only where they violated the rights of the farmers; and if they were wanted in the town he was satisfied with the arrangement. He liked to do honest, square business, and he thought that it would be better for them if they could say that they were asking for their rights only. They should not be selfish.

Mr. Praught, of Hazelbrook, urged on the farmers to stand together and do everything possible to "drive the automobiles off the roads." No purpose was served if one man had one opinion and another man another. It was useless if the cars were to be allowed to run on certain days and within certain limits. They must have a substantial law banishing the automobile entirely. He thought that if a vote were taken in Charlottetown a majority would be found to be against the running of the cars. The automobiles were a nuisance. In conclusion he expressed the view that party considerations should be excluded from the question, which should be dealt with as one of automobiles purely and simply.
