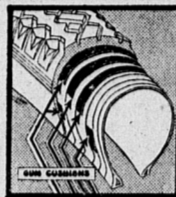

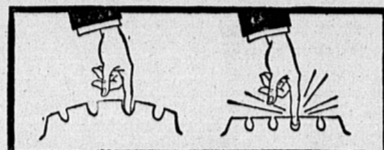

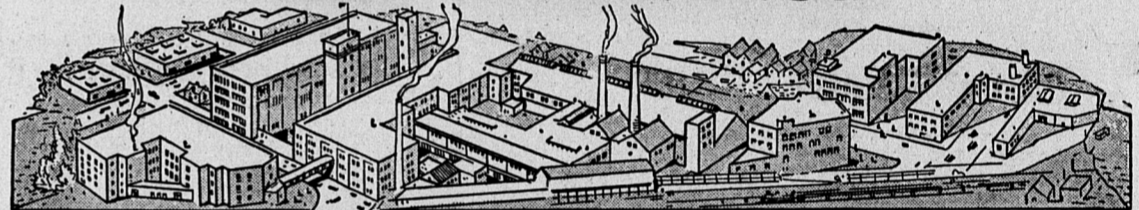

## Toronto Is Selected For Allan Cup Finals

(Canadian Press)  
VANCOUVER, April 10.—Toronto was selected as the venue for the 1934 Allan cup finals by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association today. Winnipeg was awarded the Memorial cup finals.

Any amateur who wishes to try out or practice with any professional team may do so provided the following conditions are observed:

1. That a written invitation from such professional team be obtained.
2. That the amateur obtain sanction from the branch of the C. O. A. H. A. with which he is affiliated such registration to be filed with the Dominion registrar.

The player may then try out for a professional berth and will not lose his amateur status provided no contract has been signed or money received other than for legitimate expenses. The amateur must not take part in any game with professionals.

Exhibition games between amateurs and professionals will not be allowed except where the game is for a charitable purpose in which no gate is taken. The president has the sole power to grant permission for such exhibition games.

## Easter Lily Buds Coming To Canada

MONTREAL, April 11.—At this season of the year Bermudians are busy picking and packing boxes of Easter lily buds for transmission to Canada and the United States. Shipments are carefully timed so that they arrive and will bloom during Easter week or thereabouts.

The buds are so expertly selected and packed that, barring accidents, they arrive in perfect condition even if they happen to meet with zero weather. When taken out and placed in tepid water, the buds will quickly start unfolding and very soon burst into full flower.

These flowers coupled with their exquisite perfume, give some idea of the effect of a Bermuda lily field in full bloom in its native surroundings. Not only in gardens, but in rolling acres of cultivated land the lilies bloom everywhere in glorious profusion. Seen with a background of dark-folaged cedars, an emerald tinted sea glistening in the distance and an azure sky above, they leave a never-to-be-forgotten impression of im-

table beauty and fragrance. Bermuda is a veritable garden of flowers the year around for frost or snow are unknown in these little islands. Every month of the year the pink and scarlet hibiscus delights the eye; for seven months of the year oleanders with their masses of pink and white flowers are in bloom, lining the roads and, in clusters, enhancing the charm of many a Bermuda home.

In July and August the brilliant poinciana with its slashes of crimson catch the eye at every turn and lastly, from October to June, the roses. Hardly a garden in Bermuda that does not boast a rose bush, some growing wild in rank luxuriance, others carefully cultivated to exquisite perfection. All this in Bermuda, which has been called "the land of the lily and the rose."

This Easter, doubtless, thousands of Canadians will again be reminded of a past visit or be tempted to undertake a future visit to Bermuda by the gift of a box of Bermuda lily buds which will, for a time, bring a bit of Bermuda into their own homes.

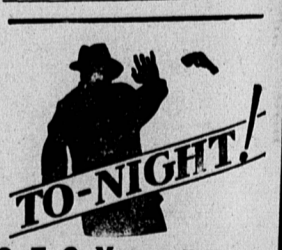
## RUTH JUDD IS GOING MAD
