**Central Guardian Mr. W. C. S. McLure Speaks on Address**

year by year in the wilds.—the conservation of them must be dealt with to supply the trade's requirements. Mr. Speaker, in this Province practically one phase only of Fur Farming is being developed, viz: Fox Farming, and there are golden opportunities for Mink, Sable and Muskrat farming. While Fox Farming might not yet have a pleasant odor to all of us; yet Mr. Speaker, it has made Prince Edward Island better known in Europe, Western United States, than any product that we produce, with the exception I might say, of our men. A few days ago I received a letter from Germany, and the writer said, among other things, "please inform me if Prince Edward Island is all woodland, and do you foxes that produce such rare specimens of fur, run at large all over the Islands?" Now this man had never heard tell of P. E. I. till Fox Farming taught him his first lesson. Fox Farming brings tourists to our Province; immigrants to our lands, revenue to the Tax Department of the Province, and gives some thousands of men profitable labor employment. The export of live animals during the past year, according to statistics furnished by the Canadian National Express Company, about 6,000 animals, while the estimated number of skins shipped were in the neighborhood of 8,000;—adding a total wealth to the Province from its export trade of over Three Millions of Dollars, which I am sure is a conservative estimate.

It is a pity, Mr. Speaker, that our Government has not a Fur Trade Department in connection with its Agricultural Department, where complete statistics could be gathered, and the time will come when Fur Farming must have this recognition from our Provincial Government; because Fur Farming, is only in its infancy. It is quite true, Mr. Speaker, that all cannot make a success in fur farming, neither is there 100 per cent success in gold mining; manufacturing, or in the various kinds of farming; but when practical intelligence, combined with careful work and good business ability, is applied to fox farming, one can be assured of a fair measure of success.

The essentials for Fur Farming are these: Pure foundation breeding stock, proper types from a fur trade point of view, never losing sight of the fact that fur is the basic principle of the whole industry. Perhaps the greatest mistake we are making today, (and that has been made) is that we are exporting our fine live animals to other countries, making a bitter competition for the Fur Trade markets. This is a mistake, the same as the export of Pulpwood from Canada, but how and who will remedy it?

Now Mr. Speaker, I don't wish to weary this House with Fox Farming, and would not have said so much about it only on account of its omission from the Speech from the Throne. Like all other Agricultural industries, Fox Farming has on a very important matter in connection with its success, and that is the marketing of our product. Much harm has been done by lack of proper grading and preparing for markets, our Furs. It is most gratifying, Mr. Speaker, to note the satisfactory results that are coming to the products of this island, when farm products are sold by proper grades and classification. And my hope is that cooperative marketing will continue to grow until we are all thoroughly educated that properly preparing our products for selecting, grading or standardizing, is the greatest impetus to create a demand.

**AGRICULTURE**

In the Speech from the Throne, agriculture has been referred to as the basic industry of our fair Province—and so it is. Let the farmer set a good example with fair crops, and a good demand for his products,—like what has been in 1926—and everybody gets a new feeling,—as sometimes referred to—"A grand and glorious feeling."

In the fall of 1925 the business man took on a new lease of life, the bank managers were pleased, the tax collector had it easier,—in fact everybody had it made easier for them. Why?—because the farmer had a chance to make good; and if there is any class of people who show their willingness to make good, it is the farmer and his wife. It should be, therefore, the first consideration of the Government of this Province to give every aid possible to the farmer with his basic industry.—Make the farmer prosperous, and he will make all others

We have the place for a summer tourist trade; we can make the accommodations (if not already sufficient, but our hotels now are excellent); we have the best dirt roads of any Province. In fact the Leader of the Opposition has said some of them are "Real Boulevards."

**GRAVELLING OF THE MAIN APPROACHES TO OUR CITY**

This, Mr. Speaker had been a much talked-of subject for many years, but this Government has taken the matter up and the most satisfactory results have been shown. I will not deal at any further length with regard to our Highways, but just to say this:—The present Government found the side roads and ones adjoining the Public Highway in very neglected condition. I am speaking of my own district, but these have been well attended to, though owing to the neglect for four years under the late Government, much work has to be put on them by the present Public Works Department. I congratulate the Government on the success of its road policy, and I am sure in doing so I reflect the opinions of all unbiased citizens of this province.

**LABOR**

It is sometimes said that we have no labor problems in this Province. Well, Mr. Speaker, I cannot quite agree with that statement. True, we have no formidable strikes, because our labor is honorable. But our labor problem is not a "lack of ready employment." And this is one of the things that is depleting us of our population. We have the best labor in the world in this Province, and it is undervalued from a wage payment standpoint. Now no place can prosper and grow unless the wage earner receives a real living wage. What is it that builds up the country and the town?—LABOR. Labor on the farm, labor in our industries, and labor on our streets! Then why grudge the laborer a living wage? I was glad to see at a meeting of our City Council a few nights ago, the promise given to the representatives of labor, that the scale of wages would be raised to \$3.00 standard; and I feel certain, Mr. Speaker, that the Honorable Minister of
