NEW YORK, Dec. 19.-(CP)-The Canadian dollar continued to move ahead in the free foreign exchange market today, closing about 1-16 of a cent at 86.68 3-4 cents in terms of the United States dollar. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 90.0-9.01 per cent discount).

The Shanghai dollar dropped around 10 of a cent. Most other foreign currencies ended unchanged from the previous closing rates. Pound Sterling closed at \$4.04 for open market cables.

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.-(AP)-Neither domestic nor foreign happenings provided buying inspira- tion for the stock market today and, on balance, the list chalked up its fifth successive losing session.

Bell Telephone, off one point at 102, lead Canadian issues generally lower. International Nickel, Walk- er, Ford, Lake Shore, Mines and Shawinigan topped fractions. De- tlers Seagrass, Dome Mines, and Brazilian Traction were steady.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 2 of a point at 43, putting this composite back to about where it was in September of this year and in 1939.

Dealings broadened at intervals— slow stretches were plentiful—and transfers amounted to 732,030 against 779,620 the day before. On the losing side were shares of Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, International Paper, preferred, Loew's, Philip Morris, Eutaw, Kodak, Westinghouse, General Electric, American Smelting, Consolidated Edison, North American, J. I. Case, Texas Corp., and Chesapeake and Ohio.

U.S. Steel came out with a gain of 1-8 and Bethlehem was off an equal amount. General Motors was unchanged and Chrysler a shade. Improved were American Telephone, Standard Oil of N.J., Anacosta, Montgomery Ward, Goodyear, American Can and Corn Products.

Bird Banders Active

Bird-banding returns received by the national parks bureau of the department of mines and resources show that 2,433 birds were banded in Canada in the first ten months of 1940. As many of the banders do not send in their reports until the end of the year, it is estimated that when complete figures are received the number of individuals banded during the year will be in excess of 40,000. Water fowl, principally ducks, appear to be receiving special attention from banders in Canada this year, and hunters who have found banded birds can assist this important work by reporting the facts to the bureau.

Although bird life becomes scarce in the more northern and in the central parts of the country with the approach of winter, bird banding is a year-round activity in the Dominion. Many of the banders do extensive banding work when the snow is on the ground for at this time of the year some inland stations are visited by redpolls, snow buntings, blue jays, purple finches, "nine skins, gros- beaks, and other winter birds. In Canadian localities where waterfowl winter, large numbers of these birds are banded during the winter months.

Most of the bird banding in Canada is carried on by about 200 vol- untary workers, who hold bird- banding permits under the author- ization of the Migratory Birds Con- vention act. The official bands are of aluminum and are inscribed with a serial number and letter or num- ber designation. Because birds are international, the work of banding them is conducted in full co-oper- ation between the Dominion and United States governments, and to a certain extent with Newfound- land Mexico and South American countries.

U. S. Warplane Production

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.-(AP)-An output of 1,500 to 1,700 warplanes a month—a rate of 18,000 to 20,000 a year—will be achieved by American factories in the next seven months, reliable sources in the aircraft manufacturing industry estimated today.

Considerably shy of the periodic forecasts of production since last August, these figures are based on the available engines, machine tools, aluminum forgings, magnesium castings and the supply of trained factory personnel.

This fact can be added to the statement of William S. Knudsen, production chief of the national defence commission, last week that aircraft production was 30 per cent behind schedule—the industry itself appears to have been overly optimistic in reporting its capacity to Washington.

Figures submitted to the Defence commission by airplane makers last summer, intended to picture the production peak which could be reached in January, included all types of airplanes, private commercial and military.

That led Knudsen on Aug. 8 to announce that the rate of warplane manufacture was 10,800 a year and would pass the 18,000 mark in January.

The actual production of military aircraft by American factories in this calendar year will be slightly in excess of 5,000 machines. The trade press for months has posted a red light on forecasts of mass production until the influence of new engine factories became felt in 1941.

With the more conservative figures as a barometer, warplane output during the coming year takes on a much less dismal appearance than that reflected in the Knudsen statement. The engine problem, probably the worst of the many facing the industry, has been more critical by shipments of engines to Britain to power British-manufactured planes.

Orders for those engines were placed before fresh demands for army and navy planes were made last June.

In 10 more months a fresh flood of engine manufacture will burst upon the industry from new factories—branches established by plants now working at their peak and by automobile companies. In the same period 150,000 to 200,000 specialized workmen will have been trained for both aircraft and engine manufacture.

Thousands of Nazi Children Are evacuated

LONDON, Dec. 18.-(CP)-The Ministry of Economic Warfare said today it had received information that more than 850,000 children had been removed from Berlin, Hamburg and the Ruhr district to southern and eastern Germany because of the intensity of British bombing raids.

News Briefs

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.-(AP)-With full military honors, the United States gave further expression today to the nation's esteem for the Marquis of Lothian, honoring his ashes with a temporary resting place among America's revered dead in Arlington National cemetery. Under the mast of the battleship Maine a short distance from the grave of the unknown soldier, a vault was prepared to receive the British Ambassador, who died last Thursday. Funeral services—followed by private cremation—were conducted yesterday at the Washington Episcopal Cathedral; where the Right Rev. James E. Freeman, Bishop of Washington, prayed that God might "strengthen and sustain" the British people "in this hour of their need."

LONDON, Dec. 18.-(CP)-Three thousand tons of Turkish tobacco, and 90 tons of Greek tobacco, the first of a consignment valued at \$800,000 (about \$3,850,000) which Britain is taking in payment of interest on British loans to her two near eastern friends, has arrived in England. This tobacco is to be mixed with stocks of United States leaf on hand to introduce a new blend to British smokers. To conserve dollar exchange purchases of United States tobacco have been stopped and a change to Turkish is being made gradually.
