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IN RIVER FOR HOURS WHILE FLAMES PASS

Lumbermen Burned When They Raise Heads to Breathe.

PORT ARTHUR—June 12—Lying on their backs or standing waist-deep in a creek, 70 drivers were forced to spend two hours in the Sunday River while flames roared and crackled about them and leaped over their heads to the other bank. To-night one of them lies in hospital here while others wear bandages.

The men were working in the township of Jacques, 20 miles northwest of here. The forest fire came roaring through the bush at a rate estimated at 40 miles an hour. The men fled before it to the creek, a mile away.

Here they threw themselves into the water. For two hours they stayed there while the fire passed them. Albert Tremaine had his face so badly burned when he exposed his mouth to breathe that to-night he could not be recognized. He lies in hospital.

Lewis Derwin is in almost as bad shape. His lips and nose are burned. Others who suffered are Joseph Pigeon, Peter, Albert and Rene Blanchette, George Bishop, Oscar and Albert Valley and Frank Ukkala. One of the Valley brothers will be permanently scarred about the face and mouth. Another man's back is badly burned.

Tremaine is in bad condition. He is literally swathed in bandages and can hardly breathe because of the effect of the smoke on his lungs. The men lay in the water they watched a horse burn to death on the bank and one man was carried away by the current but saved himself by clinging to logs.

LIBERAL NOMINATIONS FOR QUEEN'S

Mr. R. H. Jenkins and Dr. Cyrus Macmillan Only Nominees Suggested At Convention—Mr. D. J. Riley Elected Association President.

At a convention of the Queen's County Liberal Association, held yesterday afternoon in the Strand Theatre, Mr. R. H. Jenkins and Dr. Cyrus Macmillan of McGill were unanimously nominated as Liberal candidates for the County in the forthcoming Federal election. The names of Mr. Jenkins and Dr. Macmillan were the only ones brought before the convention. Mr. Jenkins' nomination was moved by Mr. Joseph Brazil, Johnston's River, seconded by Mrs. Reuben MacDonald, Charlottetown; Dr. Cyrus Macmillan's by Col. Allan McLeod, Hartsville, seconded by Mr. T. W. Morrison, Flat River.

Mr. D. J. Riley, vice president of the Association presided. Speeches were made by the candidates and by Senator Sinclair, Premier Lea, and Hon. J. P. McIntyre.

Senator Sinclair in the course of his address intimated that Dr. Cyrus Macmillan's nomination would shortly be followed by his inclusion in the King Cabinet.

Resolutions were passed endorsing the policy of the King Government and re-affirming confidence in the Prime Minister; commending the work of the Liberal representatives Messrs Sinclair and Jenkins; congratulating Mr. Sinclair on his appointment as Senator, Hon. A. C. Saunders on being appointed to the Supreme Court Bench and endorsing the

N. Y. MARKET RECEIVES WORST SPILL OF YEAR

With But One Exception, Break Worst Since Panic of Nov. 13th.

NEW YORK, June 12—The Stock Market received its worst spill of the year yesterday. With only one exception it was the worst since November 18 when stocks hit bottom in the autumn selling panic, as measured by the composite price index of 90 representative issues.

Most of the more active issues recorded losses of about \$2 to \$20 a share. The price index of 90 issues lost 6.4 points and at 176.3 was at the lowest level since late January and only eight points above the low of the year, of January 2. It was 99 1-2 points below the 1930 peak, reached April 10, and 35 points above the 1929 low of November 13. The loss of 6.4 points was exceeded on September 12 by a loss of 9.6. During the autumn crash there were several days in which the index dropped from 10 to 25 points.

Trading was in comparatively moderate volume until the late flurry which swamped the trading facilities and kept the tickers running more than 40 minutes after trading ceased.

Total sales were only 4,477,390 shares less than on either Monday or Tuesday, and comparing with \$279,260, the year's record of May 5.

CANBERRA, Australia, June 12—A deficit of \$45,000,000 for the current fiscal year is disclosed by the public accounts of the Australian Government.

At the same time it was announced the Commonwealth Loan Council had approved the terms of the Federal Government's new loan of \$50,000,000. It is for a period of eight years and will bear interest at the rate of six percent per annum.

Australia's expenditure on loans in the fiscal year, 1928-1929 was \$220,000,000 and a scheme to reduce this in 1929-1930 to \$120,000,000 was also approved by the Commonwealth Loan Council.

Sarcophagus, 1,750 Yrs. Old

IS FINER THAN SO-CALLED ALEXANDER TOMB AT ISTANBUL

ISTANBUL, Turkey, June 11—A Greco-Roman sarcophagus 1,750 years old has been discovered by William Buckler of Princeton and Oxford and Prof. Calder of Oxford at Afion Karhisar, during their Anatolian expedition just ended.

The excavators said that the sarcophagus was finer than the so-called Alexander Tomb at Istanbul and was perfectly preserved.

When found, the lid of the tomb was being used as a village watering trough. The sarcophagus will be transported to a Turkish museum.

APPOINTMENT OF CANAL COMMISSION

Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., Among Commissioners Appointed by Order-In-Council.

HALIFAX, June 12—An enquiry into the economic possibilities of the proposed Chignecto Canal is authorized in an order-in-council taken out at Ottawa yesterday morning.

The order appointed a commission to hold the enquiry, composed of the following:

Professor Duncan Angus MacArthur, head of the history department of Queen's University.

Frank MacKenzie Ross, president of the Saint John Dry Dock Company and also of several other leading companies in Canada and largely interested in shipping.

Hon. J. J. Johnston, K. C., of Charlottetown, formerly Attorney General of Prince Edward Island.

A. B. Saloom, M. A. D. C. L., professor of economics at Acadia University.

Early in the year surveyors completed their work on the Isthmus of Chignecto and handed in their report to the Department of Railways. One hundred and one years ago the Nova Scotia government authorized the construction of a canal to link up the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy. The scheme fell through and during the years that followed the matter was brought up at odd intervals. A few years ago the Amherst Board of Trade brought the old subject back to life and gradually enlisted the support of the government at Ottawa.

BAD STATE OF AFFAIRS IN DETROIT

Workless Pace The Streets All Day Looking For Work, While The Homeless Sleep In Parks.

DETROIT, June 12—The workless pace the streets all day looking for work that does not exist; the homeless sleep in the parks at night. This is the state of affairs in Detroit in June, when the automobile industry is normally at its best, when relief and charity are commonly at a low ebb for the year.

Three hundred transients found a free bed last night at the McGregor Institute. Another three hundred and fifty paid the small fee expected of those who have funds. That filled the house.

In the winter you can't turn men away into a twenty below zero night, even if the house is full. Douglas McGregor, grandson of the founder of this benevolent institution, said today that one night last winter 1,235 men slept there. "Where did you put the other 855?" I asked, subtracting 650 the capacity of the institute, from the grand total. He smiled, "We filled the chapel first; then we had 350 lying on the floor in the sitting room."

Fairfax Captain Gives Evidence At Investigation

ie Admitted That His Ship Was Moving Too Fast In The Fog For Safety—Was Travelling Over 11 Knots.

BOSTON, Mass., June 12—Captain Archibald Brooks, of the liner Fairfax, testified at the Federal investigation here today that the sea disaster which overtook his ship and the Fall River Tanker Pithis, Tuesday night was over so quickly that any S. O. S. calls could not have brought help quickly enough to cut down the loss of life. The crash took the lives of forty-six persons, Captain Brooks admitted in response to questioning.

2 SENTENCES OF 3 YEARS IN DORCHESTER

16 Year Old Lad Sentenced By Mr. Justice Saunders Yesterday.

SUMMERSIDE, June 12—The final stage of the case of the King against Rufus Gaudet, engaged the Supreme Court during its very brief session this morning. Mr. Justice Saunders briefly addressed the prisoner, pointing out the seriousness of the misconduct of which he had pleaded guilty in twice breaking into Brace McKay and Co. store and stealing goods or money. He referred to the strong appeal for leniency made by his counsel Mr. M. M. Bill, but pointed out that there was little to be urged in extenuation of his actions. He had resisted his father's control, had associated with bad characters, had engaged in bootlegging and had twice broken into a store and committed theft. Another man one with a wife and family had been charged with the former of the two cases of shopbreaking and he the prisoner, had stood by and seen this man convicted of the crime, ought to be sent where he would be taught some useful trade so that when his term of imprisonment ended he would be able to be of some use to the world. He therefore sentenced him to three years in the penitentiary at Dorchester, New Brunswick, the same penalty on each of the two charges to run consecutively.

Gaudet is sixteen years of age.

The Supreme Court adjourned at noon on Thursday there being no further business on the docket. At this session there were no civil damages or jury civil cases on the docket. The only thing in the nature of a civil case was an absent debtor case which only took a short time to dispose of.

OTTAWA, June 12—Surprise is being expressed in the capital today when it became known that Major W. D. Herridge, D.S.O., a well-known Ottawa lawyer, is accompanying Hon. R. B. Bennett, Conservative leader, in his campaign. Major Herridge is a personal friend of Hon. Vincent Massey and his family has always been identified with the Liberal party. He is a son of the late Rev. Dr. W. R. Herridge, pastor emeritus of St. Andrew's church.

Boy Scout Saves Man, Child From Whirlpool

Drags Frank Bellingham And Son From Seven Sisters Rapids—Acted Promptly.

WINNIPEG, June 12—William Stedman, boy scout, 14, saved a father and his small son from death in the rapids at Seven Sisters Falls, Sunday, when he rushed to the bank with a stick and reaching it out, dragged the pair to safety.

Frank Bellingham, a Winnipeg fireman and his family were enjoying an outing at Seven Sisters Falls. His son, Frank Jr., was playing beside the rapids. His foot slipped on the rocks and he fell into the water. The father plunged into the rapids, not holding the fact that it would be impossible for him to save the boy or himself in this way.

William Stedman, seeing the father struggling in the water to keep himself and his son afloat, remembered his "be prepared" training obtained a long stick and thrust it towards Mr. Bellingham who grasped it and the boy here pulled father and son to safety.

"It was a close call," said Mr. Bellingham today. "I never realized that I could do my son no good by plunging in after him, for then it was impossible for me to get out. The boy scout surely saved our lives and he is a hero in our eyes from now on."

One Tariff Policy For All

"It will be the duty of the Conservative party to prove that our tariff, controlled by these who have experience in truth, operates as well in the service of the consumer as the producer. A tariff properly framed, administered and controlled, would ensure to the Canadians markets, and domestic competition would guarantee fair prices.

"For we do not believe that any section of the community should prosper at the expense of another. If, after investigation, there is any producer of this country levying excessive charges upon the consumer I will put a stop to it.

"I know, too well, the difficulties under which the producer has been working; the uncertainty as to the tariff; the consciousness that any day may bring changes through the action of foreign Governments or through the irresponsibility of our own; the instability of markets and the difficulty of developing a constructive plan of development; in many cases have made high prices to the consumer without reasonable return to the producer.

"The employment by the Conservative party of the principle of national safeguarding will not permit any producer to avail himself of our protected measures to unfairly profit at the expense of the consumer. For the protection of the Conservative party will apply equally to the four great masses of the country: the agriculturist and the worker, the manufacturer and the consumer. And I propose that any government of which I am the head will at the first session of Parliament initiate whatever action is necessary to that end, or perish in the attempt."—Hon. R. B. Bennett at Winnipeg, June 9, 1930.
