In the same room (22) on Saturday morning from 10 to 10.30 Dr. Garrison will lecture on tuberculosis and the remainder of the morning period will be taken up with a practical lesson on millinery.

THE SPECIAL TRAINS.—The special train which went to Cape Traverse on Wednesday evening at 8.45 o'clock returned to the city yesterday at 4.30 p.m., without mail, as there was no crossing by the Capes yesterday. She left again last night for Cape Traverse at 8.45 o'clock. The special from the steamer at Georgetown reached the city yesterday at 1.35 p.m. and left on Saturday evening at 7.15 o'clock. Hereafter, except on Sunday, this train will leave the city at 7.15, and on Sundays at 8.45 p.m.

ACTION FOR DAMAGES.—In the Supreme Court yesterday morning, before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and a jury, the case was begun in which Jas. McInnis, of Selkirk, had brought an action against Wm. Cox, of Montreal, for the recovery of \$2,000, which the plaintiff claims as damages for the seduction of his wife by the defendant. Mr. J. J. Johnston, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, while the defendant was represented by Mr. Neil McQuarrie, K.C., and C. D. MacCallum. Considerable interest is being taken in the case, and long before the judge took his seat on the Bench the courtroom was almost filled. The case occupied the attention of the Court from 11.15 a.m. until adjournment at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, when the plaintiff was still being examined by Mr. Johnston.

ENGINEERS' CARD.—The N.C.O.'s of the Engineers' Corps of the first Canadian expeditionary force, at Salisbury Plains, issued a very nice Christmas and New Year Card, emblematic of their company, which they sent as greetings to their friends back home. A number of the cards have just been received by friends here. On the front cover of the card is the coat of arms of the mess, a circle with the words, "N.C.O.'s Mess, Canadian Engineers," surrounded by a wreath and mounted with a crown. In the centre is a beaver. Below this is a scroll, on which appears, "First Canadian Expeditionary Force." The back cover has the names of all the N.C.O.'s. The inside leaflet has a photo of the departure of their majesties from the Canadian Engineers' lines in an automobile, while the boys wave their hats and cheer. On the opposite page of the leaflet is the word "From," with a blank for the name of the sender, followed by the words, "and all members of the Non-Commissioned Officers' Mess, Canadian Engineers, First Canadian Expeditionary Force, with best wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. Flying Sheds, St. Darrington, Salisbury Plains, Christmas, 1914." The card is a very good souvenir of the corps' first Christmas in the Old Country.

THE FIRE AT FREDERICTON.—The following particulars have been given regarding the fire at Fredericton last week. The fire started at 3 p.m. on Friday morning (not Saturday). There were only two men in the house at the time (Mr. Weeks and his son Heber). It became evident very shortly after the fire was discovered that it could not be checked so both occupants ran to the neighbors for help. In due time men were there to the number 12 or 13 who worked like bricks to remove furniture. They succeeded in clearing out the large sitting-room, parlor and one bedroom. Everything upstairs was destroyed this included much bedroom furniture and clothing. Everything in the kitchen was saved and about 450 bushels of potatoes and other material was lost in the cellar. With great difficulty the woodshed, containing a year's dry hardwood, was saved. Fortunately the wind was light and from the south east which was off the kitchen outbuildings—otherwise the loss would have very far exceeded \$3000. There was only \$750 insurance on the house—which would hardly cover loss of furniture destroyed. Mr. Weeks will rebuild in the spring.

INCREASED PRODUCTION.—The Canadian Countryman of Jan. 16th, has a great deal to say about planning for an increased farm production in Canada this year. The British government even before Australia's crop was known to be a total failure and allowing for fifty million bushels shortage in Canada's and about 450 1914 wheat shortage at three hundred and seventeen million bushels. If Canada's grain crops are actually doubled this year prices are almost sure to be as high as they are today, or even higher. The termination of the war will have a influence on this. Even before the war broke there was recognized the great shortage of meat and animal products. This shortage exists now in an acute form, in horses, eggs, cheese, etc. Belgium has lost practically every milking cow, and Germany, Austria and to some extent France and Britain are being compelled to sacrifice a great number of cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry. During the war wheat and other grains will probably be most

keenly in demand, but as soon as the war is over livestock for breeding purposes will be urgently needed to restock the depleted farms of Europe and to make up for the shortage that will be sure to exist from over selling in America. Every farmer in Prince Edward Island should ask himself what he can do to increase his farm production within the next year. The Agricultural Conferences that are now being held will give the farmers an opportunity to discuss this among themselves and to get help and information from the Government experts. On Thursday evening Mr. Richard Creed will discuss this subject at Brookfield and on Friday at North Wiltshire. The following week he will be at Kinkora, Springfield and Stanchele.
