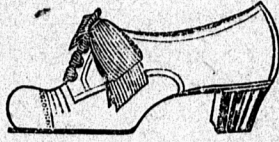

GOVERNMENT STEAMERS. The steamer Lady Laurier and the steamer Stanley are doing buoy work in and about the harbor. The steamer Minto, which is to make a trip to Hudson Bay, is expected to arrive here next week to load. She has been under repair at Charlottetown and will leave here under the supervision of officials of the Hydrographic Survey Department.

ORWELL HEAD. The sacrament of the Lord's supper will be dispensed at Orwell Head next Sabbath, July 13th, 11 a. m. Meetings are being held every night this week, proceedings to be addressed by neighboring ministers. Preaching, Saturday, at 10.30 a. m., in Gaelic, by Rev. John Gillis, also in English at 11. Rev. J. C. Martin of Lunenburg will preach, Monday, July 14th at 10.30 a. m.

IMPROVING RESIDENCES. Several unsightly fences surrounding beautiful homes and lawns in Summerside and Charlottetown, have been removed, adding one hundred per cent to the appearance of property. This will become more general in common with other cities, as property holders see the great improvement it makes to the street and neighborhood.

WOMEN AND THE WEST. "A young woman able to fry bacon can go to the West and beat Daisy Markham, because she will be able to get both the man and the money," was the statement of conditions for women in the West made by General Sir Ian Hamilton, the distinguished British soldier, who visited Charlottetown yesterday, on his return from a flying inspection trip to the coast.

TIGNISH. The closing exercises of Tignish High School were held on Monday, June 30th. The ratapayers present were loud in their praise of the work accomplished. The classes were interspersed with recitations and choruses, all of which did credit to the performers. Some recitations worthy of special mention were those delivered by Miss Sibyl Palmer, Maxwell Murphy and Master Henry Perry. At the close of the examination addresses were read to the teachers, both of which were accompanied by valuable presents. Mr. Neiligan, the principal, was presented with a fountain safety razor and Miss Kinch with a gold cross and chain.

EXAMINATION. The semi-annual examination of Hampton School was held on June 30th. There were quite a number of the parents and others interested in the school work present. Mr. Guy McKenzie (student of Dalhousie), Mr. J. H. Myers M. L. A., Miss Minnie Inman, teacher at Stanley and Miss Edna Nelson, teacher at Bideford, kindly assisted the teacher Mr. E. Stanley Brown in a thorough examination, in each of the various subjects. The pupils by their correct answers and general knowledge acquitted themselves very creditably and gave evidence of the thorough and careful work being done by the teacher. All present expressed their entire satisfaction in the marked advancement made during the past year.

POLICE COURT. At the Charlottetown Police Court this morning Allan Bolser vs. Frederick Roberts for an infraction of the prohibition act was dismissed. Herbert Marshall for fast and disorderly driving was fined \$5 or 20 days. Charles Marshall for abusing and insulting an officer pleaded guilty and was fined \$3 or ten days. Edward Hennessy for being drunk and disorderly was fined \$20 or sixty days and Wm. Power for assaulting a police officer was given three months in jail.

EXAMINATIONS. The closing examination of the Victoria High School took place on Friday afternoon, June 27th. On account of the inclemency of the weather the number of parents and visitors was not as large as it would otherwise have been. Those present, however, expressed themselves well pleased with the work done in both departments of the school. The examinations in the Assistant's department was conducted by Mrs. Jabez Lea, a former teacher in this department of the school. In the Principal's department the work was examined by Mr. Guy McKenzie, a student of Dalhousie University. At the close of the examination, prizes were distributed, after which Mr. McKenzie gave an encouraging address to the school, impressing on the minds of the pupils "that they had their part to play in the working out of the destiny of this Canada of ours."

LIVE STOCK MEETING. The Live Stock meeting at Mayfield on Saturday July 5th conducted by W. J. Reid, B. S. A., live stock instructor, was well attended, the adjoining sections were well represented. Mr. Reid in commencing to judge the horses, said there are three distinct types or classes. The roadster, the carriage and the draft horse, he described the necessary size weight and formation of each class. In the judging of the animals quite an object lesson was given, in having the defects and the correct construction in the different parts explained. Mr. Reid strongly condemned the practice so prevalent in cross breeding having no distinct type to produce a proper type of animal it is necessary to breed along straight lines. In judging the cattle he said there were two distinct types in Dairy and the beef animal and outlined the different formations of each. The Northern Institute was much pleased with receiving the valuable instruction in connection with live stock from Mr. Reid, and hope the meetings in other sections will be well attended.

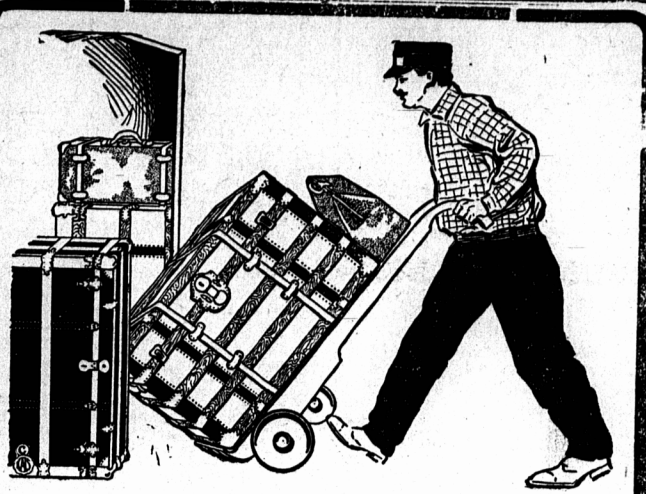
NEW STEAMSHIP LINE FOR HALIFAX

HALIFAX, July 8—A new steamship line to Canada has been inaugurated, the Italian General Navigation Company having put on five steamers for a service between Genoa and Halifax, known as the Italian-Canadian line. The steamer Palermo sails from Genoa today for Halifax, calling at Palermo and Naples. She will leave Naples July 11th. From Halifax the steamers of this line will proceed to Boston. The Palermo will

leave Halifax for the return voyage to Naples on August 4th. The line starts with good prospects for traffic in passengers and freight.
