Egg And Poultry Marketing Report

The production of eggs in Prince Edward Island although considered high for the season of the year, is 10 per cent lower than for the same period last year, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, supervising poultry products inspector. If present rate of production continues, it will not be long until this deficit is equalled and surpassed. The quality of the product is good and if cared for, graded properly, and moved to market regularly, should be a product excelled by no other pack.

The market has developed a weaker tone due to increasing supplies of eggs arriving on Maritime markets. As supplies of pullet eggs increase, producers can expect lower prices. Prices have been shaded slightly this week. Producers are receiving for ungraded eggs from operators of grading stations AL 55-7, AM 33-5, AP 35-8, B 36-9, C 24-6. Local dealers are quoting for the graded pack in new cases job station AL 60, AM 59, AP 38, B 45, C 31.

Specialized producers are quoting retailers for the graded carton pack AL 70, AM 68, AP 50, B loose 50. Carton eggs are retailing to producers at AL 77, AM 75, AP 57, B loose 57-8. In regard to poultry, many enquiries are received in regard to present and future prices. Perhaps a review of past operations is the best answer to these enquiries. At least producers will have the facts and can form their own opinion on this subject.

Export Poultry Market

The high prices received for poultry during the past few years was made possible through an export outlet or market. In the beginning, poultry was shipped to the United Kingdom and when this market for poultry was lost, a market for all surplus poultry was secured in U. S. A.
Up until recently, it was quite easy to sell poultry in the U. S. A. Prices were high and buyers were active but the position for the future promises to be more difficult. It is assumed and starting now and for the balance of the season that the U.S.A. will have a very large crop of poultry. The effects of this are already apparent. Poultry prices in U. S. A. have eased and continue to ease until today they are not much higher than those in Canada. As a result of these lower prices, two things may be expected to follow from the present position in U. S. A. If as seems indicated prices are to be somewhat lower than during the past year, more poultry is going to be sold in Canada and with selling to the United States to be more difficult, more effort will be directed towards selling in Canada. A greater amount of poultry will have to be consumed in Canada this year. Prices will depend upon the extent this surplus can be absorbed.
